

Electric Shop Adds More Space To Display Room

B. J. Scott Completes Remodeling of Business Quarters

Investment of approximately \$2,000, in remodeling his show rooms, new fixtures, new paint, and other improvements at the Torrance Electric Shop, 1419 Marcelina avenue, has given B. J. Scott one of the most attractive storerooms in the city and has added greatly to the effective display of electrical appliances carried in stock at this address. Since the Scotts moved from their apartments constructed in the rear of the store, the proprietor has been busy with alterations. The partition walls enclosing the apartment have been removed, giving a great deal more shop space, and in front an archway has been cut into the rear wall of the show-room and another display room added to this area which permits more effective arrangement of the larger equipment, such as refrigerators, washing machines, etc., in the front, with show cases and wall cases for the smaller equipment in the adjoining aisle.

New overhead light fixtures of handsome design have been installed. These lights are controlled by a time clock arrangement which makes possible an illuminated evening display.

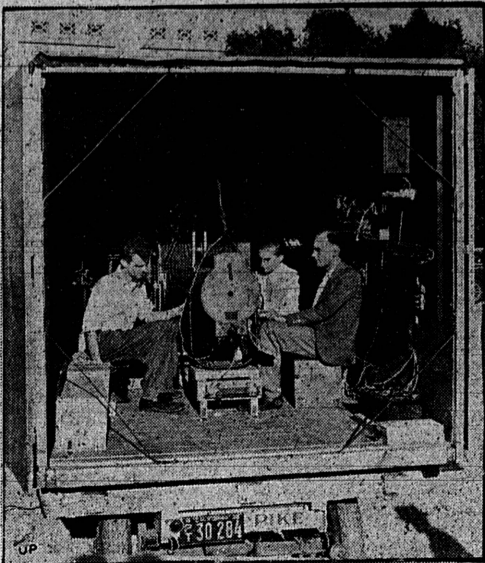
In addition to the increased floor space, Mr. Scott has made arrangements with the Southern California Edison Company to use their display room and also their warehouse for storage and now has on hand for immediate delivery a large stock of electric appliances, much larger and more varied than he had been able to carry with his formerly limited space.

Business has been steadily on the increase at the Torrance Electric Shop in the past year or two, so much so that Scotty is unable to devote as much time to hunting as he used to do. Committee Appointed To Confer With Glendora Property Owners

Further steps toward opening negotiations for the possible use of "surplus" water of the Metropolitan Water District were being taken today, with appointment of a committee of the directors to confer with property owners in the foothill area east of Glendora.

The committee, named by Chairman W. P. Whitsett, consists of Franklin Thomas, Pasadena's director; J. H. Ramirez, of San Marino; John R. Richards and Victor H. Rossotti, both Los Angeles city directors. A committee from Glendora, San Dimas, La Verne and Claremont appeared before the directors on July 19 and stated they desired information as to advantages of membership.

"This is a very important district," Chairman Whitsett said in announcing the appointments, "and I understand our staff already has a great deal of information ready for them."

"I also understand there are other districts considering membership in the district," Whitsett said.

Orange county residents also are desirous of information on any "surplus" waters. Director P. A. Hapgood of Anaheim said the directors, at the chairman's suggestion, authorized the same San Gabriel valley directors committee to confer with Anaheim residents. Hapgood said that while Anaheim would not require the amount of water allotted to it, it desired to keep its allotment and if possible run it into underground reservoirs

to build up the receding water level.

Representatives of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation sat in on part of the meeting. The directors were told that the R. F. C. had purchased a total of \$89,500,000 of the district's bonds to date in order to finance construction of the \$220,000,000 aqueduct.

The directors, on motion of Director Warren A. Butler, of Compton, authorized preparation of an embossed resolution of condolence to be sent to the family of the late William Mulholland, pioneer Los Angeles water district engineer who died several days ago.

Huge Gain Shown In Ford Sales

Registrations of new Ford passenger cars and trucks in Southern California and Arizona, the territory served by the Long Beach branch, were more than 9,000 units greater the first six months of the year than for the corresponding period last year, branch officials report. The total of 22,693 units registered represents the best first six months sales period since 1930.

In Southern California alone, 18,078 new Ford passenger cars and 2,792 truck and commercial cars were registered. This makes a total of 20,870 Ford units, an increase of 70 percent over the first six months of last year.

The total of 20,870 Ford units is indicative of the tremendous buying power in Southern California when it is considered that in this territory alone approximately 115 Ford units have been registered on an average daily, for the first 181 days of the current year, including Sundays and holidays.

Ford dealers also point to the fact that the preference for Ford is nationwide. Figures announced recently by the Ford Motor Company show that, during the first six months of the year, 631,961 units were sold in the United States. This is nearly two-thirds of the 1,000,000 cars and trucks which Ford is building this year. In June alone 100,882 units were sold throughout the country. This is the fourth consecutive month that Ford sales have topped 100,000. During the first six months this year, Ford paid out \$38,727,508 in wages and spent \$374,368,873 for raw materials, a great part of which was for wages in other industries, officials said.
