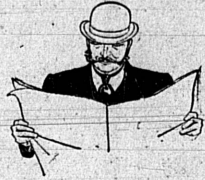

Furnishing more than 10,000,000 man-days of labor, in the construction of:

1. Three great reservoirs in the High Sierras, five huge hydro-electric plants, three double circuit 220,000 volt transmission lines, each 250 miles long, to bring the power to Southern California.
2. One of the world's greatest steam electric plants, with a capacity of 556,300 h. p., to be built on tidewater at Long Beach.
3. 13,800 miles of distribution lines to distribute this power over an area of 12,000 square miles.

Another Volume Production Year In Car Industry

President of Chevrolet Motor Company Views Conditions In This Section

That 1936 will be another volume production year in the automotive industry was indicated by M. E. Coyle, president of the Chevrolet Motor Company when the motor executive announced during his trip in Southern California that Chevrolet is greatly expanding its production facilities for the coming year.

Mr. Coyle and W. E. Holler, vice president and general sales manager, spent five days visiting Southern California dealers and holding sales meetings, coming to this region from Detroit because of the importance of the coast market.

Eleven major assembly plants, 12 manufacturing plants and 40 parts warehouses, spotted strategically throughout the nation, are under the direct supervision of Mr. Coyle. The expansion program of Chevrolet, in anticipation of the increased demand expected for Chevrolet passenger cars and trucks next year, is affecting all of the company's manufacturing facilities, Mr. Coyle said.

Sales figures announced by the visiting executives during their visit revealed that automobile sales are holding up this year at a high level, month after month, instead of diminishing after reaching their peak in the spring.
