Public Utility Companies Protest Valuations Placed On Properties

Fourteen public utility companies have protested the valuations placed on their properties in Torrance, Lomita and other sections of Los Angeles county, according to information reaching the county assessor's office today.

Hearings before the state board of equalization were under way this week in the state capital, with Chief Deputy John Hartman representing the assessor's office. He was accompanied to Sacramento by M. W. Moore, of the assessor's office and Deputy County Counsel Gordon Boller. The protests were scheduled to be heard in the following order:

Tuesday—Pacific Electric Railway.
 Wednesday—Tank car companies.
 Thursday—Southern California Edison Company.

Friday—Southern California Gas Company, Independent Fuel and Supply Company, Southern Fuel and Supply Company, Los Angeles Gas and Electric Company, Southern Counties Gas Company.
 Saturday—Standard Oil Company, Union Oil Company, pipe line operators.

Next Monday, August 12, Southern California Telephone Company's protest on valuations placed on its extensive Los Angeles city properties is expected to consume considerable time. Protest of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company, is set for the same day. The Los Angeles Junction Railway's protest on valuation of its belt-line railroad in the central manufacturing district is scheduled for August 13 and the objection of the Pullman company is the last Los Angeles protest, on the calendar for August 14.
