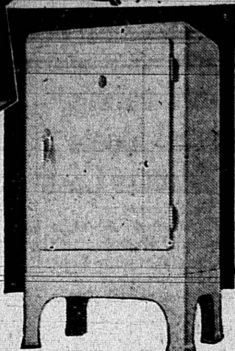

night was removed to the Jared Sidney Torrance Memorial hospital, where he passed away shortly before 12:30 noon on Monday.

Funeral services, conducted at Stone & Myers chapel at 2:30 p. m., were brief but impressive.

In his ten years of residence in Torrance, and in his business as manager of the Bank of America, Jim Leech became well and favorably known to almost everyone in the city.

James Weston Leech was born July 5, 1882, in Morgan Park, Illinois, a suburb of Chicago.

One day, as he was passing the quarters of one of the largest banking institutions in Chicago, the lettering on the front door caught his eye.

He went in, and got a job as messenger, but, said Mrs. Leech in telling the incident, "This was where Jim made a big mistake. He was told to come to work at 7 in the morning, and he worked from that hour until as late as 10 o'clock at night, running errands for the bank staff.

Jim stayed on at this institution for ten years and rose to be chief clerk. Later he extended his banking experience through many localities, Phoenix, Tucson, Arizona; Albuquerque, New Mexico; and finally to California where he helped to organize the National Bank of Hermosa Beach.

Later this bank became, as it is now known, the Bank of America, and under Jim Leech's effective guidance has become one of the leading business institutions in Torrance.

In 1918, Mr. Leech married Miss Harriet Vull, the wedding taking place in Tucson, Arizona. He leaves besides his widow, four sons, George, Weston, Richard and Robert; and one sister, Mrs. Amy Duden, of Long Beach.

Columbia Steel Bids On Power Line

Bids for the construction of the 230,000-volt transmission line to carry power from Boulder dam to points along the Colorado river were being tabulated and analyzed yesterday by the electrical division of the Metropolitan Water District.

Other bidders were the Columbia Steel of Torrance, the Columbia of Los Angeles, Alta Electrical and Mechanical Company of San Francisco, and the Forney Engineering Company of Dallas, Texas. The contract has not yet been awarded.

Picture of Last Stagecoach Is Valued Curio

Lomita Man Has Unique Collection of Postal Service Data

Arthur T. Scott, Lomita resident, who is an ardent collector of stamps, cachets, and also of historical facts and interesting data concerning the postal service, is the owner of a kodak picture of the last stage coach, carrying mail, passengers and express to operate in the United States.

Shortly after that date the completion of the railroad put out of business the stage operating between Casper and Landers, Wyoming, a distance of 150 miles, a star route out of Casper. Horses were changed every 15 to 20 miles and the route was covered in 30 hours.

Mr. Scott's scrapbook also contains several photos of the first ship to shore experiment in handling mail, when the 666-year blimp picked up mail from a ship returning from Honolulu to be brought ashore and delivered to the postoffice in San Pedro.

Imperforates are made of all new issues, and are sold in blocks of from four stamps to a full sheet. Apparently the interest in stamp collecting, always more or less active, has taken a great increase in recent years.
