Taxpayers Are Warned to Be On the Alert

Loopholes in Law Permit Increased Expenditures By Governing Bodies

SACRAMENTO, (U.P.)—California taxpayers should be prepared to defend themselves at all times.

This is the warning issued by Richard E. Collins, chairman of the state board of equalization, in calling attention to the fact the law does not always protect the person who pays the bills.

"Many taxpayers apparently are laboring under the delusion that the statutory 5 percent limitation on yearly increases in county, city and school district budgets will automatically guard against any attempt to destroy the 15 percent average tax saving which should result from the transfer of utility properties from state to local tax rolls," Collins said.

"That assumption is entirely fallacious and exceedingly dangerous. As one example of the loopholes which exist, and which will permit greatly increased expenditures unless the public insists on strict economy, the 5 percent limitation provision is cumulative.

"Any county, city or district which has not increased its budget for the last three years will be legally entitled to increase its new schedule of expenditures 15 percent over the 1932-33 year, or 10 percent over the 1933-34 budget. Moreover, due to the increase in property subject to local taxation, increased spending can be accomplished without increasing the tax rate, a condition which requires redoubled vigilance."

Collins also warned the taxpayers that there has been considerable confusion and misapprehension due to the fact that the constitutional 5 percent limitation on spending ceased to be self-enforcing on June 30 of this year and the added fact that the new limitation act adopted by the legislature does not become operative until September 15.
