Committee Named To Investigate Consolidation

Mayor Shaw Appoints 21 Citizens to Formulate Plans

Appointment of a committee of 21 prominent citizens to conduct a study and make recommendations looking toward the reorganization of government within the Los Angeles metropolitan area was announced today by Mayor Frank L. Shaw.

Selection of the committee is in conformity with a special message sent to the city council last April by the mayor, in which the latter stressed the need for reorganization and simplification of local government units within the county, as a means of relieving municipal taxpayers of what he termed the unjust burden of county taxation.

The mayor declared the committee will be given an absolutely free hand in conducting its studies and making its recommendations, suggesting, however, that a remedy for existing conditions may be found in one of five proposed plans:

- (1) Consolidation of city and county governments.
- (2) Separation of the present city of Los Angeles from the county and the formation of a combined city and county government within the limits of the present city.
- (3) Consolidation of functions of the various jurisdictions within the county.
- (4) Legislation that would redivide property within the city from the burden of all county taxation except that necessary to pay the costs of services actually rendered by the county to the city.
- (5) Abolition of county government and the substitution thereof of regional divisions under which the state itself would render all governmental services not performed by the municipality.

"It will be the duty of the committee," the mayor said, "to study the merits of these and other suggested plans and to recommend which, in the committee's opinion, is the most feasible and practical."
