Facts Worth Remembering About The History of U. S. By CHAS. B. ROBERTSON

Prior to 1824, the State Legislatures "appointed" the Presidential electors, and the people therefore voted only indirectly for them, their choice being expressed by their votes for members of the Legislature.

The election of 1824 was the first time that any candidate for President received a million votes. Harrison, the victorious, received 1,375,017 votes. Henry Clay ran three times for President of the United States, in 1824, 1832, and 1844 and was beaten by 38,473 in 1844 by James K. Polk.

In 1824 Andrew Jackson had 50,655 more votes than John Quincy Adams yet the House of Representatives made Adams President.

March 3, 1822, President Monroe by a message to Congress recommended the recognition of South American States and Mexico. When it came up to vote March 28, Congressman Garnett of Virginia cast the only vote against the resolution.

In Congress, Dec. 22, 1824, the House by a vote of 166 to 26, the Senate unanimously, voted to General Lafayette \$200,000, and a township of land in any part of the United States he might select that is now unoccupied.

On March 22, 1822, the House by a vote of 72 to 99 defeated the bankrupt bill.

The cornerstone of Bunker Hill monument dedicated June 17, 1825. Lafayette was present. Daniel Webster delivered the oration.

The first advertising agency was established in 1826, and in 1840, V. B. Palmer established an agency that had branches in Boston, Philadelphia, and New York City.

No advertising was carried by magazines until 1860, at which time an advertisement appeared in Atlantic Monthly, Boston, Mass.

In 1830, 172 persons out of each thousand were engaged in agriculture, 15 in commerce and 51 in manufacturing.

In 1730 molasses was converted into rum in "stillhouses" in New England. The most thriving center was Newport in Rhode Island, where 1,800 hogshead of molasses was imported yearly.

From 1790 to 1870 imports to the United States exceeded exports by \$2,000,000,000, but 1874 exports exceeded imports for the first time.

If Texas had a population of 150,000,000 people she would have the density of population of Shantung Province in China.

On May 24, 1819, the sidewheel steamer, Savannah, left Savannah, Georgia, for Liverpool, England. She arrived in Liverpool June 29. This was the first steamship to cross the Atlantic.

Daniel Boone, the great frontiersman, died at Charrette, Missouri, on September 26, 1820, age 85 years.

On February 21, 1821, the electoral vote was counted for President, James Monroe received all but one of the total. A New Hampshire elector withheld his vote, because he did not wish another to share with Washington the honor of being elected unanimously.

Lafayette left the United States for France after a memorable visit with the people. The government furnished him the new cruiser Brandywine for the return trip, September 7, 1825.

On September 17, 1825, Mordecai M. Noah selects Grand Island in the Niagara River, as a site for city of refuge for Jews, to be called Ararat.

On April 8, 1826, during the debate on the "Punama congress" in the Senate, John Randolph of Virginia, refers to the coalition of Adams and Clay, of Kentucky as that of "Puritan and the black-

Service POMONA.—Three quarters of a million people will witness one of the greatest panoramas of agricultural progress and achievement ever assembled in the presentation of the 14th annual Los Angeles county fair combined with Riverside and Orange county fairs at Pomona, September 13 to 29. The culmination of 12 months of intensive preparation, the fair this year represents the expenditure of \$250,000 and the labor of some 2,000 men. Every phase of southland activity has been canvassed to present a comprehensive review of achievement in the great empire of the southwest.

The result is a marvelous collection of agricultural, horticultural and industrial exhibits placed before a gorgeously colorful background of pageantry, magnificence and enchantment. For the throngs from other states throughout the nation there is a rare opportunity to view, within the shortest space of time and under the most delightful conditions, a vivid picture not only of accomplishment, but of aims and ideals of one of the richest sections on earth.

Innovations, improvements and additions characterize the huge exposition this year. Congress appropriated \$40,000 on March 14, 1826, and appoints Richard C. Anderson minister to Colombia, and John Sargeant of Philadelphia as delegates to a meeting of South American states, to meet in Panama to consider the rights of these states.

Abduction of William Morgan from Canandaigua, N. Y., in September 12, 1826, gave rise to a political party, the anti-Masonic, that became national in importance, though short lived.

On September 29, 1827, boundary differences between the United States and the British possessions were referred to an arbiter.

Congress by resolution grants to Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, only surviving signer of the Declaration of Independence, the franking privilege, May 23, 1828.

Second railroad in the United States completed September 14, 1828. It was nine miles long and extended from Mauch Chunk, Pa., to the Lehigh River.

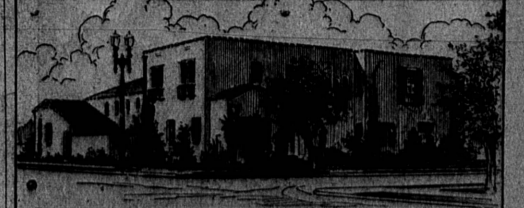
