Keeping Up With Torrance High

Football season started out with an extra loud bang for the Torrance Tartars of 1935 when they defeated the Phineas Banning High School football team of Wilmington 7-6 last Friday on Wood Field. The Tartars fought their way down the field to the first score of the game in less than four minutes after the kickoff. The touchdown and a beautiful conversion were made by Jack Javens, veteran right half-back.

The finish of the first quarter and first half was about an equal battle with very little headway for either team. In the latter part of the third quarter, the Banning boys punted. The punt was received and fumbled within a few yards of the goal, with a Banning man recovering the fumble, for the second score. The conversion was blocked, leaving the Tartars only one none-too-illustrious point ahead of Banning. Although the game ended with neither team acquiring any more points, the Tartars were on pay dirt when the final whistle was blown.

Thursday morning, September 19, 1935, was the scene of a pep rally held in the gym for the purpose of arousing some enthusiasm for Friday's game. Louis Zamperini opened the rally and introduced Coach B. J. Donahue, who explained to the school the conditions of the football squad as compared to other school teams in the Marine League and also the Tartars' chance for another championship.

Songs were led by Mildred Higgins and Peggy Wood, while Jack Piper, one of last year's yell leaders, led the school yells. Jack is leading yells with no assistance so far this year and is doing splendidly.

A new municipal and school auditorium has been proposed for Torrance. This, of course, is of great interest to the school because it has been necessary to use the gym for that purpose.

With a new auditorium, dramatic classes could be formed and plays presented to the public; an opera and several music festivals could be given by the Madrigals Society, and suitable aud calls could be held. To the citizens of Torrance the new auditorium would be of great value. National holidays could be celebrated by a meeting in this place; the Torrance Municipal Band would have a much better place to practice as well as a place to present concerts. Campaigns, such as Health week, Fire Prevention week, and Red Cross Aid, could be properly conducted. All in all, Torrance would be receiving a civic auditorium which will further beautify and build up the city. The federal government is supplying half the cost of building and the other half will only call from three to ten cents out of every taxpayer's monthly budget. There will be work for the many unemployed at Torrance, a new civic center for the people and building that will be a pride and joy for every one. Remember that election, September 27, 1935.

Another innovation has taken place at the high school. This consists in a new type of hall pass. It is galvanized disc and has the teacher's name stamped on it. The pass is very conspicuous and can't be slipped in the pocket.

This is a contrivance of much relief to the teachers, as it entails much less work. Hall passes no longer have to be made out and only one student at a time can be absent from the room.

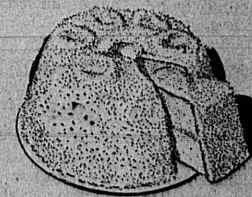
