

### Tunnel Through Mountains Links Communities In Coast and Valley

Direct access by automobile into Torrance from northern valleys, including San Fernando, San Joaquin and Sacramento, is afforded by means of a new route via a recently completed section of Sepulveda boulevard, the formal dedication of which is planned for the latter part of September. The route runs from Ventura boulevard, San Fernando Valley through the Sepulveda Tunnel, in Santa Monica mountains, thence affording access to the coast highway.

"The new link of Sepulveda boulevard," says Don Dawson, general manager, Southern California division of General Petroleum Corporation, "enables inland motorists to travel to the west and south coast beaches without contending with traffic through the Los Angeles downtown area. It is a part of a great distributed highway system recommended in 1924 by the Automobile Club of Southern California. Unquestionably it will divert more traffic from Northern Inland valleys to points along and near the west coast."

### Water Line to Harbor Will Be Finished Oct. 1

Owens Valley Water Furnished to Consumers After That Date

Laying of the 30-inch pipeline in Western avenue for the city of Los Angeles has been taken over from the SERA by city under force account, and work now is progressing from both ends of the job at a rapid rate.

October 1 has been set for completion of the project, which will bring Owens valley water to Wilmington, San Pedro and the harbor district for the first time. Adequate water supply for any industries desiring to locate in the Los Angeles sheeting addition also is assuring by the construction of the pipeline.

The line is extending south on Western avenue to Manchester avenue to a point north of Gardena, where it will curve east to Normandie avenue and run south again on Normandie to Anaheim boulevard, where it will be linked with San Pedro and Wilmington supply system. September 15 was the original date of completion, but discontinuance of the SERA has caused a delay and the department has since taken over the project and is doing the work by force account.
