Tartars Look Good

First Practice Game With Banning Is Taken By Torrance, 7-6, Friday

Hopes for a repeat of the successful season of 1934 soared high with the first practice game on Wood Field Friday afternoon when the 1935 edition of the Torrance Tartars defeated Banning, 7-6. As this game was merely for the purpose of looking over the material both coaches sent in as many substitutes as possible and nearly the entire squad of Torrance high, 60 in number saw some action during the game.

Jack Javens, flashy halfback, scored for Torrance in the first quarter and converted for the extra point. On this drive Torrance took the ball 50 yards on the line plunges, driving the Banning squad relentlessly back to their goal posts.

Second quarter found squads battling back and forth in mid-field with neither able to gain. In the third Banning recovered a fumble on the 15-yard line and Tyler crashed over for six points. Place kick for the extra point was blocked before it was well started.

In the last quarter Torrance made a couple of marches for good gains, but were unable to cross the goal-line. The Tartars had the ball in striking distance at least four times during the game but failed to go over.

Lotto Petrovich, Banning man, was the first casualty of the season. He was taken out in the first quarter with a dislocated shoulder, but a trip to a Torrance doctor fixed him up and he returned to watch the game from the side lines.
