## Contracts Let For Material For Power Transmission Line From Dam

Clearing the way for the launching of work on the 237-mile power transmission line from Boulder Dam to the pumping plants of the Colorado river aqueduct, the board of directors of the Metropolitan water district awarded contracts totaling \$1,561,705 for construction and material.

The awards were made subject to the approval of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

Total cost of the 230,000-volt line, which ultimately will carry 36 percent of all the electrical energy generated at Boulder Dam, will be \$2,266,204, including materials, rights of way, engineering work and other items involved in the undertaking. Bids received for aluminum conductor were \$187,331 to \$257,162 lower than comparable bids on copper conductor.

The awards, made by the board on the recommendation of General Manager F. E. Weymouth, provide that the huge power system use aluminum conductor, except for ten miles of its length.

The following contracts were awarded:

(1) To the Aluminum Company of America for aluminum conductor and appurtenances—\$614,316.98.

(2) To the Anaconda Wire & Cable Company for the ten miles of copper conductor which will be used—\$37,246.71.

(3) To Fritz Ziebarth for construction of the 237-mile line—\$407,246.71.

(4) To the Pacific Coast Steel Company for furnishing steel towers—\$402,800.36.

Friday's action by the water district board followed the receipt of two sets of bids on furnishing the conductor. The first set of tenders was opened on August 20, and all bids were rejected by the board. The awards were made on the basis of the second set of bids, received September 25. It was pointed out by General Manager Weymouth that the aluminum prices received on September 25 were \$11,916 lower than those received in August.

The steel reinforced aluminum cable which will be used is approximately one-inch in diameter. The General Manager drew attention to the fact that this type of conductor has been used extensively for high tension transmission lines for the last 22 years and that there is now more than 14,000 miles of aluminum line in the United States and Canada.

It is estimated that construction of the line will require approximately two years time and will employ in the neighborhood of 300 men directly in the field. Preliminary work will be started at once, and construction probably will be launched in about two months.

## Tax Funds Allocated To Torrance

Through a communication from the state highway department, the city council was informed this week that an allocation of \$9,800 had been made to Torrance out of the gasoline tax funds, for the two-year period of 1935-37, which is to be applied to the construction of state highways within the city boundaries. An additional sum of \$8,260 is allocated to be spent on city streets, of which \$3,665 is allotted for work during the first year, 1935-36, and \$4,595 for the second year, 1936-37.

City Engineer Frank Leonard is now preparing a map of the streets in Torrance, showing the major streets to be improved at some future date.

According to Councilman W. H. Stanger, who obtained the information at the meeting of the State League of Municipalities last week, if there are no streets to be improved, or if the money allocated is not sufficient to do the necessary work in any given year, the funds may be allowed to accumulate until the amount is sufficient to complete the proposed jobs. Or, he further stated, the funds for the year may be used to purchase street equipment, and suggested that the city of Torrance use the present allocated funds to buy a street sweeper.

This matter will be checked up with the state highway department or accuracy, and if it is found to be correct the city may make use of its fund for some such purpose as suggested.

## Plans Approved For Barge Canal Project Survey

Papers on Important Public Work Have Been Sent To Washington

Prospects for the ultimate extension of the Los Angeles harbor by way of Dixie Slough to Torrance and other inland communities, were given an impetus by the action of WPA officials at Los Angeles, who informed the city council of Torrance this week, that the plans for a survey, which this city is sponsoring, had been approved in the Los Angeles office and had been forwarded to Washington.

The cost of the survey will be approximately \$3,400, all of which will be borne by the federal government. The City of Torrance will provide office quarters and certain equipment for those who are engaged in making the survey, if the project receives final approval.

Plans for extending the harbor by means of barge canals to enlarge the dock facilities at Torrance and provide direct means of loading ocean going vessels at the interior towns of the harbor section, have been under consideration for many years, but has been delayed for lack of adequate financing. Under the present opportunity to obtain federal funds for large projects, which will give work to the unemployed, the prospects for an early consummation of the plan are very favorable.

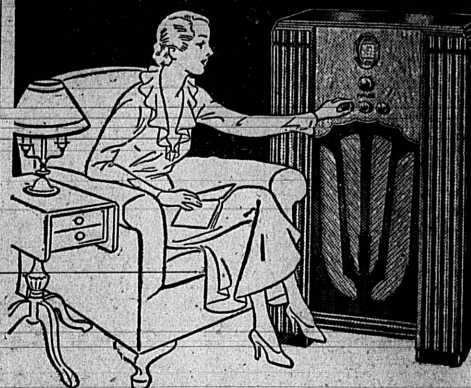

## Lomita Woman Is Acquitted In Jury Trial

Mrs. Grace Taylor Found Not Guilty of Arson Charges

Mrs. Grace Taylor, Lomita property owner, stood cleared today of charges that she had set fire to property in Lomita, at 26354 Hillcrest avenue, by reason of a verdict of acquittal returned by a jury in Los Angeles county superior court.

The jury took the case at 10:30 o'clock Friday morning, but was unable to reach a verdict by noon. After taking two hours off for lunch, at a downtown Los Angeles hotel, the jury returned to its deliberations in the jury room at 2 o'clock, and at 2:25 announced through its foreman that a verdict had been obtained.

The verdict was read in the courtroom of Superior Judge William Tell Aggeler, department 44, at 2:30. The verdict acquitted her on two counts, one count of arson, and another count of burning insured property. Eight women and four men sat on the jury.

Exhibits in the courtroom included photographs that showed how lubricating oil had been poured on a mattress on the bed in the vacant house, which Mrs. Taylor stated she had been clearing through to show prospective renters.
