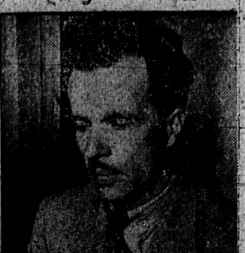

Paris Styles

PARIS. (U.P.)—The three-piece ensembles of skirt, jacket and top coat promise to be as smart as ever this year.

Coats have been altered somewhat from last year's type of three-quarter swagger coat. This year's coat length is variable, for it is seen as low as skirt length and as high as finger-tip length. As a rule these top coats are beltless and full, with the exception of the fitted seven-eighth coat. Fullness is often achieved by back pleating, and often by gathers at the front and back squared shoulder yoke.

Lucien Lelong's version of this type of suit is in tobacco brown wool. His coat, a few inches above the hem line of the skirt, is full and is lined with beaver fur, with a collar of the same. The skirt is slightly flared and has a waistline which is a trifle lower than last year's. The tailored jacket has small revers, tailored like those on a man's business suit and is brightened by an orange and brown striped tie like a stock at the throat.

Henry Crede's version is a long coat in a brown and white tweed mixture which has a plaid stripe in cocoa brown, and a lining of the same. This is worn over a tweed skirt and a blouse of the cocoa colored wool. This tailor frequently does away with the short tailored jacket by providing a warm blouse of heavy wool or of velvet.
