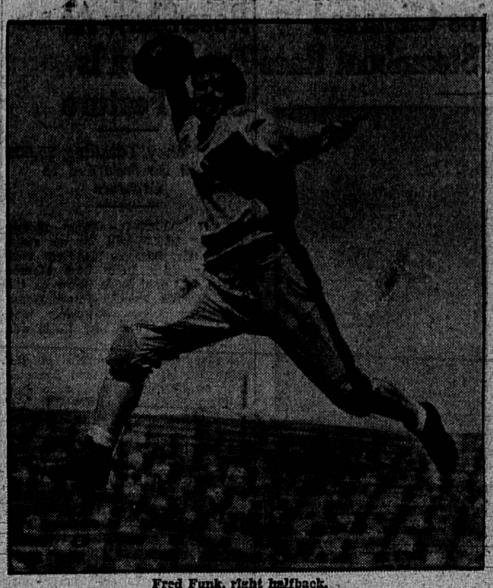

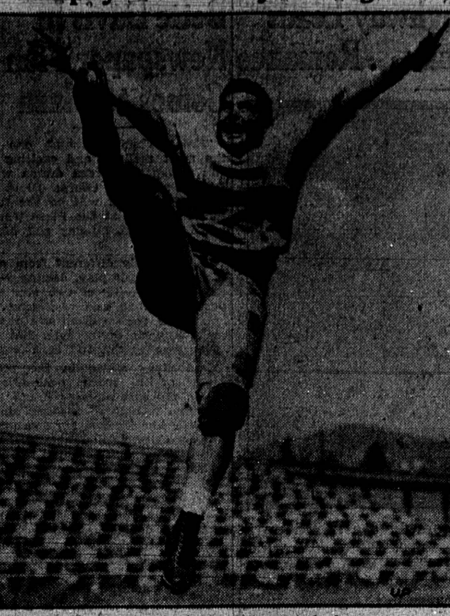

BUCK HUNTING costs the hunter MANY BUCKS

The average cost to the hunter of buck deer shot in California this season is a hundred and eighty bucks—meaning dollars; and the kill will be about 76,000 bucks—not dollars. These figures are estimates by veteran rangers and furnished the outing bureau of the Automobile Club of Southern California by the U. S. forest service.

Probably 115,000 hunters will spend an average of four or five days in the mountains and one out of every seven will get a set of horns. They will spend about \$25 each, thereby spreading \$2,875,000 among sporting goods dealers, resorts, hotels, garages and local communities.

Rangers figure that only one out of 300 hunters will be careless with fire, but that one is something to worry about.
