### Sepulveda Blvd. Celebration To Be Held Oct. 20

Two-Section Caravan Will Traverse Highway to Sunset Boulevard

Due to many difficulties encountered, the Sepulveda highway celebration committee has found its plans upset from time to time. Finally the date has been set for Sunday afternoon, October 20, and this date has been accepted by many state highway officials, as well as the city and county of Los Angeles.

**Two-Section Caravan**  
One division of the two-section caravan will start from Seal Beach and Long Beach and travel through communities which eventually will be on a fully completed Sepulveda highway, and pick up cars and floats en route, finally going through El Segundo where Inglewood and Hawthorne and other nearby communities will join the caravan; thence following Lincoln boulevard to Washington boulevard and east thereon to Sepulveda highway where it will be met by state highway officials and Governor Frank Merriam, and greeted by representatives of the Chambers of Commerce of Venice and Culver City.

**Torrance Joins In**  
Cars occupied by Mayor Scott R. Ludlow, members of the city council, city officials, Secretary L. J. Gilmeister of the Chamber of Commerce and other Torrance citizens will join the caravan when it passes through this section at 12:30.

The caravan will then continue up Sepulveda to Santa Monica boulevard where cars and floats from Santa Monica, Beverly Hills, the West Los Angeles area and other communities will join, and then proceed up Sepulveda highway through the mountains and the tunnel to Sherman Oaks. At this point it will make a turn around and join with the caravan from San Fernando valley. The caravan will then proceed in double column back through the tunnel and down the highway to the point of the celebration ceremonies, at the northwest corner of Sepulveda highway and Sunset boulevard. The program is scheduled for about 3:30 p. m.

When Torrance schools were first made a part of the Los Angeles school system, J. H. Manly, in charge of assignment of principals, sent to Oregon to obtain the services of Mr. Elson who assumed the administration of the schools in this city. His achievements at that time are well known to those familiar with the history of our schools. Since he left here he has acted as principal of three of the most prominent Los Angeles city schools, San Pedro, Roosevelt and Hamilton. At present he holds the position of chairman of the committee on curriculum policy and program studies for the secondary schools of the Los Angeles system.

Mr. Elson received his A. B. degree from the University of Nebraska, and since that time has attended the Armour Institute of Technology, and the University of Washington. He received his M. A. degree from the University of Denver and is at present studying for his doctor's degree from the University of Southern California.


