

## Great Work By Javens

Plunging Halfback Scores Two Touchdowns and Conversion to Defeat Oilers

Jack Javens, plunging halfback for the Torrance Tartars, smashed his way over the El Segundo goal line for two touchdowns and converted one of them for a 13-0 score, in the opening game of the Marine League season, played last Friday on the Tartar field. A large crowd of citizens and students watched the game.

El Segundo, with a team of veterans who have played together for four years, was confident of taking the Tartars when the whistle sounded for the start of the game, but was outplayed all along the line and failed to put up more than a minor threat, which faded rapidly after the first quarter.

At the end of the first period Torrance had the ball on the Oilers 5-yard line, from which in the opening of the second Javens crashed over left tackle for a touchdown, after Chuck Smith and Jimmy Ammon had opened up the way. Javens converted and the score at the end of the half was 7-0 in favor of the Tartars.

El Segundo took a brace in the third and held the Tartars although the Torrance outfit was close to the line several times. In the fourth Javens ran 40 yards to put the ball on the Oilers 20-yard line and on the next play over tackle put the ball over two tries for the extra point failed.

Johnny McFadden, captain for the day, looked good at end and made several long gains on end-around plays, especially in the first quarter when he was given the ball four times and put the pigskin on the Oilers' 16-yard line, where El Segundo held.

Phillip Jensen, at left guard and Donald Haynes at left tackle, were outstanding in the line. They felt the brunt of the Oilers' attack as practically all their plays were directed at the left side of the line.

For the visitors, outstanding players were Steinizer, at guard, Gordon West, center; Al Sullivan, guard, and Bill Dennis, quarter. Dennis was knocked out on a play in the fourth and was taken to the Jared Sidney Torrance Memorial hospital with a slight concussion, but recovered soon after and was able to go home.

Torrance, although somewhat outweighed by the Oilers, outclassed the visitors, according to the yardstick which showed Torrance making 15 first downs to El Segundo's four. Torrance attempted seven passes, completing one. El Segundo tried three, and made one. On punts Torrance gained an average of five yards over the visitors, their punts going an average of 25 to 30 for El Segundo. McFadden broke through to block two of the El Segundo kicks. Torrance fumbled five times but recovered. El Segundo once recovered.

On passes Torrance made an average of 21 yards. El Segundo 20. Torrance punted twice. El Segundo eight times.

Tomorrow afternoon, Torrance meets Leuzinger high on the home field, game called at 2 p. m. The following Friday Torrance draws a bye and on October 25 will meet Narbonne on the Gauchos' field at Lomita.

Leuzinger is expected to furnish stronger opposition to the Tartars than El Segundo, but the Torrance lads have their eyes on their second championship and will be hard to beat. Hubert Luck, who has been out with an injured ankle, is expected to get into the game at right end, and with Johnny McFadden at left, Coach Donahue will have the fleetest pair of ends in the league if not in all Southern California high school division. Look out for some aerial work when the racing ends set together.

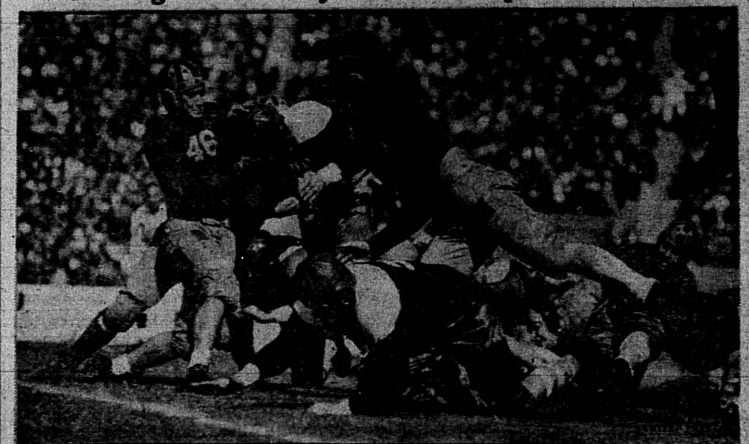

Zamperini and Luck to See California-Trojan Game

Louis Zamperini, local world's champion and Hubert Luck, star sprinter, are to be the guests of a member of the Alumni association of the University of California when the Bears and Trojan fight their annual gridiron battle in Berkeley, Saturday, October 25.
