

# Leuzinger Scores Tartars

## Hawthorne Boys Lead At the End of Half But Tartars Come Back to Win

Thanks to Coach Bernie Donahue's stinging pep talk between halves Friday afternoon, the Torrance Tartars came from behind to win over Leuzinger, 20-7. When the team took the field at the beginning of the second half the boys were fired up to do or die game and within the first five minutes of play had put over the score that turned the tide of victory their way.

Leuzinger kicked off promptly at 3 o'clock. With the ball in the Tartars' possession the team moved steadily down the field. Chuck Smith took it 40 yards deep into Leuzinger territory and on the next play Javens went over for the first touchdown, made in the first two and a half minutes of play.

Leuzinger held until the end of the quarter. In the second stanza Torrance was driven back to their 20-yard line where a penalty was called on Leuzinger. Torrance refused the penalty and Leuzinger moved the ball up a notch. Torrance was penalized 15 yards for roughing a passer and the ball was almost to the goal line from where Leuzinger pushed it over on downs. The try for goal was good and the score was 7-6 in favor of the Hawthorne boys.

Leuzinger uncorked a repeated pass attack that netted them many gains as the Tartars were weak on aerial defense. Johnny McFadden recovered on a fumble of a punt which gained 50 yards for the Tartars, a break which kept them out of trouble for a while. Carl Gilbert was injured in this period, taken out with a broken collarbone.

The half ended with Leuzinger again threatening the Torrance goal posts, but the Tartars held inches from the line. When Donahue got through with his charges in the 15-minute interval, they came out determined to show their coach that they had the stuff. From then on, it was all Torrance, with the line smashing in hard, and the ball carriers making repeated gains. Chuck Smith, who was captain for the game, couldn't be stopped and made nice yardage for the team every time his number was called.

In the third quarter Torrance swept down the field like a prairie fire and in less than five minutes had gone over for the score that put them in front. Javens made 35 yards in a spectacular end-around play and few seconds later got away for another 25 yards over the goal line. This time his kick was good and the score was 13-7. Javens further distinguished himself by recovering a fumbled punt on the 50-yard line.

In the fourth quarter Torrance marched the ball down to the 2-foot line where Smith fumbled and the ball rolled into the end zone where it was recovered by Leuzinger. It looked like a safety for Leuzinger which would have added two points to the score, but the referee ruled it a touchback and there was no score, the only damage being the loss of the ball.

Leuzinger fired some more passes, one of which was intercepted by Jimmy Amman who ran to the 10-yard line from where Torrance went over for their third score and the conversion kick was good. Smith went over for this touchdown which was made on power plays.

With the exception of the second quarter when the Tartars seemed to let down, the game was all Torrance. The Tartars made 190 yards from scrimmage to Leuzinger's 70. Yards lost on running plays, Torrance 20, Leuzinger 11. Torrance losses were largely due to the fact that Leuzinger was pointing for Johnny McFadden, and kept him boxed up continually so that the Tartars were unable to pull off any end-around plays successfully with one of two exceptions when the ball was taken by Javens.

Leuzinger attempted 16 passes four of which were completed. Torrance tried five and completed three. The Tartars' defense was excellent, particularly in the second half. ## Million Dollars To Be Spent At Santa Anita

### Maintenance of Race Track For Winter Season Runs Into Money

Measured in dollars and cents return through Southern California business channels, operation of Santa Anita park for the coming racing season of 58 days, commencing Christmas Day and running daily (except Sundays) until February 29, 1936, will result in the spending in excess of a million and a quarter dollars, according to estimates made by the Los Angeles Turf Club. Improvements in excess of \$275,000 are being made now.

It represents actual maintenance expenditures of only those directly connected with the race meeting—horsemen, officials and employees at Santa Anita park and local purchases by Los Angeles Turf Club—and does not figure the vast amounts put into circulation by the racing enthusiasts attracted here from all parts of the globe.

A large percentage of the spectators who supported Santa Anita races last season were out-of-state visitors—according to reports made by transportation companies and from registrations at hotels, apartment houses, and real estate offices. Statistics submitted by the Club of Southern California reported 40.7 percent increase of out-of-state motor tourists arriving at the Santa Anita racetrack.
