Railway Postal Clerk Examination

The United States civil service commission has announced an open competitive examination for railway postal clerk.

Applications may be filed with the civil service district office nearest the applicant, or with the U. S. civil service commission at Washington, D. C. Applications must be on file not later than October 28, 1935.

Applicants must have reached their 18th but not their 35th birthday on the date of the close of receipt of applications, except that these age limits do not apply to persons granted military preference. Applicants

must measure at least five feet six inches in height in bare feet, and must weigh at least 130 pounds without clothing. They must be in sound physical health and capable of enduring arduous exertion. Persons interested should apply at once for information to the secretary of the U. S. civil service board of examiners, at the post office or customhouse in this city.
