Jim Thorpe Dons Moleskins Again As Old Grad In "Fighting Youth"

The greatest player ever produced by the game of football is Jim Thorpe, appearing on the screen of the Torrance Theatre next Tuesday and Wednesday with Charles Farrell, June Martel and Andy Devine in the Universal gridiron picture, "Fighting Youth."

The swarthy Jim is a full-blooded Sac and Fox Indian, born on the North Canadian river and sent for his early education to the Haskell Indian school in Kansas. Later he attended Carlisle Indian school in Pennsylvania, where he developed his prowess as a football player that Glen "Pop" Warner, then coach of the team, declared him to be the greatest in history—an opinion which has been echoed by sports authorities ever since.

Though his days as a football player are long since past, Thorpe can still out-kick and

out-pass any present-day gridiron star in the country. He appears in the picture as an "old grad" who returns to college to assist in the coaching and "pepping up" of the lagging team.

"Fighting Youth" was directed by Hamilton MacFadden, and the cast supporting Farrell, Miss Martel and Devine includes J. Farrell Macdonald, Ann Sheridan, Herman Bing, Eddie Nugent and Alden Chase, as well as many other football stars of the past and present.
