

Top Horse of Vanderbilt Stable Expected To Run at Santa Anita

The public announcement of Dr. Charles H. Strub, General Manager of the Los Angeles Turf Club, that the second winter season at Santa Anita Park... opening Christmas Day and running until February 29th... will provide the finest racing in turf annals, surpassing even the inaugural meeting, is a high mark.

Of the 14 leading racing stables in the country, nine were represented at Santa Anita last year, and these are expected to return for this season's program. They were the F. M. Alger Jr. stable, whose made-over steeplechaser Azucar won the big handicap; Belair Stud, owners of Omaha; C. V. Whitney, Milky Way Farms, Mrs. S. B. Mason, owner of Head Play; A. A. Baroni, owner of Top Row; Green Tree Stables, Percy M. Pike and T. C. Worden.

Alfred Gwynne Vanderbilt was a visitor last season and has arranged to bring out Discovery and one of the largest strings on the track. The others here for the inaugural have made stable reservations and Mrs. A. M. Crech is coming with 17 of her top horses.

Figuring Mrs. John Hay Whitney, Wm. Ziegler, Jr., Warren H. Wright, Starmount Stable, A. Felletti, Mrs. John D. Hertz, and H. C. Hatch among the leading owners who were not here last winter, and checking the mass of stable applications being made, Dr. Strub has verification of his announcement.

The Los Angeles Turf Club is now working on its associate membership and expects to complete the roster of 500 within the next couple weeks. Reservations for season boxes are also being received and assignments will be made December 1.

Game Conditions In California Are Very Good

SACRAMENTO (U.P.)—Condition of California's fish and game population is unusually good according to a survey conducted by state officers.

An investigation of duck breeding conditions in the north-eastern section of the state revealed approximately 200,000 breeding birds, a report stated. "Sprig were the most abundant, followed by mallard, cinnamon teal, redheads, gadwall and other species. No less than 35,000 honker geese also were counted," the report said. "Sage hen also had a successful breeding season."

"A very careful survey is being conducted of the antelope with the end in view of considering an open season on them under a special license and limited kill."

The planting of game fish throughout California lakes and streams continued at a steady pace. During the month of August 6,386,604 trout and 656,692 salmon were planted. At that time the hatcheries still had on hand 9,066,989 trout and 472,465 salmon, the division of fish and game reported.

During the month, a total of 9,923 game birds also were released, including 5,140 pheasants, 4,490 quail and 293 partridges.

Referring to the sale of licenses the report stated:

"The angling license sales show an increase over the 1934 series. The hunting license sales, however, in all probability will not exceed those of the previous year. This is due largely to the shortening of the dove season. It is believed that the sale of deer tags will show a slight increase over the sales of 1934."

Total license sales and miscellaneous collections by the division last month amounted to \$87,663.

Storti to Protest Sunday's Defeat

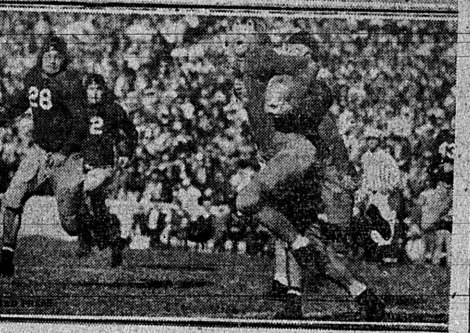
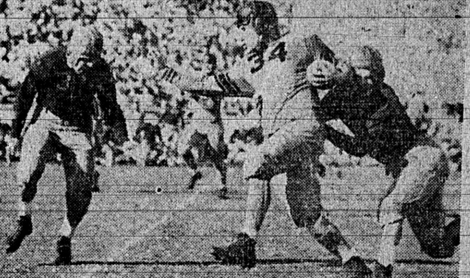
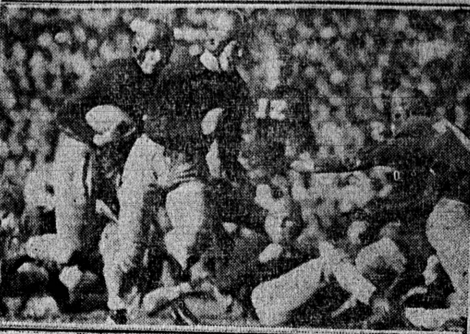

The Tartar aggregation is in top shape for the game. Dick Rodriguez, star quarterback and ball carrier, has fully recovered from injuries received two weeks ago and will be back in the starting lineup. Paul Cox, the Tartar's sensational wingman, is also ready to play for the first time in two weeks. He will start at left end. Cox is regarded as one of the best ends in Southern California jaysee ranks.

Compton and Pasadena began their rivalry nine years ago. In the first meeting between the two elevens back in 1927, they battled for the Southern California championship in the Rose Bowl before a crowd of 13,000. Pasadena won the game, 7-0.

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
