Tartars Meet Fairfax

Football Carnival At Coliseum Starts At 2 O'clock Tomorrow Afternoon

Torrance Tartars will meet Fairfax tomorrow in the annual playoff between northern and southern schools at the football carnival in the Los Angeles Coliseum. The game as usual will consist of 20-minute periods, the ball being put in play from its position on the field at the end of each period.

Northern teams are North Hollywood, Franklin, Lincoln, Fairfax, Los Angeles, and either Eagle Rock, Canoga Park or San Fernando. Southern teams are Torrance, Narbonne, Bell, Manual Arts, Fremont and Venice.

The carnival will be enlivened by the presence of 21 bands with 1,500 musicians participating in massed formation under the leadership of Louis Woodson Curtis. Proceeds from attendance will go to the P. T. A. milk fund. Attendance of 60,000 is expected.

The Tartars have been keeping in shape for the game by practice scrimmages on their home field, and hope to make a good showing against the big uptown opponent.

Narbonne scheduled outside games, defeating Banning on Friday, November 15, and the strong Los Angeles high team last Friday, 19-12.

Advantages in scoring at the carnival depend on the position of the ball at the end of the 20-minute periods, as well as on the superior beef and agility of the teams. A wide-open game can be expected, since all teams will be out to cross the goal line for the honor of their section.

Compton Tartars Meet San Diego Next Spring

First Dual Track and Field Meet Between Schools On March 14

Compton Junior College will meet San Diego State College varsity in a dual track and field meet for the first time in its history on March 14, 1936. It was made public today by Herschel Smith, Tartar cinderpath member. The meet will be the first of a home-and-home agreement and will be held at San Diego. In 1937, the Aztecs will come to Compton.

The Tartars will have one of their strongest track teams in history next spring and may upset the San Diego varsity, which looms as one of the best track aggregations among the Southern Conference colleges. Headlining the list of Tartar track luminaries, who will compete against San Diego, is Cornelius Johnson, who was the greatest high jumper in the world during the 1935 season.

How to Preserve Game During Hunt

Many hunters lose their ducks through spoilage before they arrive home, because they do not know how to treat the game, states a release received by National Automobile Club from the division of fish and game. The following method for preserving game is recommended:

First draw the ducks. Do not remove feathers. Hang up by the neck to drain and keep in the shade after wiping out inside with damp cloth. Do not soak in water after entrails are removed. Keep game in open work gunny sack to protect from flies. Do not wrap so tightly that air is excluded, which causes them to spoil. If permitted to hang in a cool place soon after they are shot and drawn, a protecting glaze will form from contact with the air. Let the ducks hang until you are ready to return home.

Actors Brave Many Dangers To Make Desert Picture



Cary Grant and Claude Rains, stars of "The Last Outpost," playing today and tomorrow at the Torrance Theatre, narrowly escaped serious injury several times during the filming of the picture.

Being a film actor is a more or less hazardous undertaking. Cary Grant and Claude Rains both decided during the filming of "The Last Outpost," the Paramount picture opening at the Torrance Theatre, Tuesday, November 26, with Gertrude Michael and Kathleen Burke.

They narrowly escaped serious injury when a boulder weighing several hundreds of pounds broke off from a rocky escarpment under which they were working and hurtled to the ground at their feet. Working under cliffs on the desert is particularly dangerous during the summer months because contractions and expansions of the rock, due to the extremes of temperature, cause large chunks to break off and fall.

The location scenes which they were filming at the time of the near-accident show the heat-ridden sands and danger-packed jungles of Arabia, the background around which this romantic story is played. The picture, directed by Charles Barton, tells the dramatic tale of two brother-officers who come face to face with death as each tries to prove his right to the girl they both love. What happens furnishes a gripping, melodramatic climax.

"The Last Outpost" is a thrilling, colorful account of war that was waged between Kurds and British on the eastern front, in the Arabian deserts and jungles, and in the mountains of Mesopotamia during the World War.

Stop Your Cars for School Buses!



Motorists either meeting or overtaking a school bus halted on any highway outside of a business or residence district to load or unload pupils must come to a full stop and then proceed not faster than ten miles an hour for a reasonable distance, warns the public safety department of the Automobile Club of Southern California. That's the State Law, to which attention is called because complaints are continually received from various districts of children's lives being endangered by violators. Such negligence frequently has tragic consequences. Penalties range from a fine not exceeding \$50 or imprisonment not over ten days in the county jail for the first offense to double for a second offense within a year, and a fine up to \$500, imprisonment up to six months, or both, for a third offense. The automobile club urges drivers to guard against these hazards to children.

December 7, Los Angeles county water works district, Kegel Canyon.

December 10, Whittier city school bond election.

December 12, Arcadia city municipal bond election.

December 12, Redondo Beach city special bond election.

Redondo Beach will eclipse Los Angeles in rapid-fire elections, with elections two days apart, while Los Angeles city elections, for school bonds and harbor bonds, have been held a week apart. Several weeks previous to the school bonds election, the water and power department put over a refinancing bond issue.
