**All Voters Must Register After January 1, Says Kerr**

Names of every local registered voter must be stricken from the great register of Los Angeles county at the end of this year, in accordance with a recent ruling of the state supreme court.

Sometime after January 1, persons may re-register, however, it was explained by W. M. Kerr, registrar of voters. Cost of the re-registration will be approximately \$141,000, Kerr estimated, and county officials had debated as to whether or not to include the item in the final budget, at the time the preliminary budget was being discussed.

As a result of this supreme court ruling, which decided a point not clear, due to an amendment of the 1935 legislature, the registrar of voters department will cost the county taxpayers more than a half million dollars this year. The supervisors allowed the department \$265,000 for salaries, \$232,000 for maintenance and operation, and \$7,000 for capital outlay, a total of some \$504,000. Of this total, \$141,868 is for registration of voters, the budget specifies.

Primary elections will cost the department \$88,000 next year, nothing being set up in the 1935-36 budget for the general election to follow, which must be met out of the coming year's budget.

In addition to the \$504,000 for the registrar of voters, the fact that a supervisory election must be held next year will necessitate the expenditure of an additional \$202,840 by the board of supervisors. The primary election will cost an estimated \$171,040, in addition to \$88,000 from the registrar of voters department. This is because salaries of election officers are met by the supervisors. While the election is not held until August, and the fiscal year ends June 30, orders for primary election materials will be placed some weeks earlier.
