SAFEWAY BUYS PRIZE PIGS



These Future Farmers and 4-H Club Members of Chino cheered lustily for Clarence Dale of Safeway Stores when he purchased the hogs shown here at 25 cents a pound during the recent Great Western Livestock Show in Los Angeles.

Meat from cattle, pigs and lambs which won blue ribbons at the Great Western Livestock Show in Los Angeles will be on sale in Safeway Stores this week, according to E. S. Randell, district manager for the company.

Although Safeway paid as high as \$1.25 per pound for animals on the hoof, the meat will be sold at regular prices, it was announced.

"Safeway had two purposes in buying these blue-ribbon animals," said Mr. Randell. "First, we wanted to give our customers the best meat in the West, and in addition we wished to do everything possible for the 4-H Club and Future Farmers of America who exhibited their stock at the show. These youngsters are going to be the stockmen of tomorrow, and we feel they should be offered every encouragement to breed and raise the best meat animals possible."

Evidence that Safeway's program of encouragement to young farmers is appreciated, is contained in a letter received by Clarence Dale, head of the meat department of the organization and signed by 24 exhibitors whose animals were purchased. The letter says, in part, "Your purchase has helped us create our own jobs at home during spare hours. It will stimulate project work through the agricultural department of the school. It shows your interest in our problems and we assure you that we will show an interest in yours by urging our families to do their shopping with Safeway."

Among the boys in this area whose stock was purchased at premium prices by Safeway were members of the Future Farmers of America and 4-H clubs of Chino, Bob Fowler of Norwalk and Ed. H. Lewis of Downey.

Narbonne High SCHOOL

As a result of the passage of the school bonds, work will be started within the next few months on a \$110,000 addition to the present \$500,000 plant at Narbonne.

The new building will extend north and south from the gymnasium. The girls' gym is to be enlarged and remodeled and a corrective room is to be erected upstairs. The nursing rooms will be in the wing next to the gymnasium. There will also be a room for social gatherings, two music rooms, two art rooms and another sewing room.

The present shower and locker rooms in the boys' physical education department will be removed and replaced by two larger rooms, a drying room, increased locker space, a boys' rest room and corrective room.

This addition will make it possible for the students now occupying tents to have regular classrooms either in the new wing or in place of the present art and music rooms.

Once again Christmas is rolling around and parents and students are looking forward to the annual community night entertainment. This year it is to be sponsored by the Lomita Chamber of Commerce.

Monday evening, December 23, is the date set, according to reports from the committee. The affair, which is open to all the public without cost, will be held in the Narbonne high school auditorium and is to start promptly at 8 p. m. The program is under the direction of Mr. Halladay of the local Chamber of Commerce.

The high school and neighboring elementary schools will not sponsor an evening of Christmas music and entertainment, as was formerly the case.

The Marine League basketball quintets will go into action for the 1935-1936 basketball season on December 6. Narbonne's varsity and B teams will face the Gardena quintets in the Mohicans' gym.

Narbonne will have four returning varsity lettermen in Schatz, Wales, Schneidorf and Hunt, having lost only one player from last year's first string by graduation. They will also have several players from last year's B team. Their attack will be centered around Jack Schatz, center, and last year's outstanding player.

El Segundo, last year's champions, appear to have the strongest aggregation. Several returning lettermen, including their last year's All-Marine center, McGraph, are sure to make them a formidable foe for any of the other teams in the league.

Leuzinger also has a strong team, rated second only to El Segundo. They have several returning lettermen from both their varsity and B teams.

Torrance and Gardena are not rated very high in the varsity division for this season.

Narbonne's varsity and B

teams are being coached by Wayne Sloss. William Thurman, a recent addition to Narbonne's physical ed department, will coach the C's and D's.

The B teams from the five schools are rated almost even, with Gardena having a slight edge over the others. Narbonne, with three returning lettermen, should have a strong C team. Little can be said yet of the Gaucha Dees because of their
