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Angle Parking On Business Streets Taboo

New Ordinance Establishes Time Limit for Stopping On Sartori

Changes in parking rules were incorporated in an ordinance introduced and passed on first reading at a meeting of the city council Tuesday night.

Prior to this time there has been no limit imposed on parking on Sartori avenue.

In addition, cars will be required to park parallel to the curb on one side of Sartori avenue, and on both sides of Marcelina avenue, in order to correct the dangerous condition on these street where 45-degree angle parking is now required.

Under the ordinance, truck deliveries in future will have to be made in the alleys, which will do away with the unnecessary blocking of traffic by a long vehicle, which not only hinders traffic but makes it hazardous because of a driver's inability to see around the end of the truck.

The ordinance will be read for the second time at the next regular meeting of the council and adopted.

Around the Council Table

Councilman W. H. Stanger represented the council this morning at a meeting of law enforcement officers, safety representatives and others called by the board of supervisors to discuss plans for lowering the number of traffic accidents.

Report on school set-up, compiled by C. J. Rambo, was introduced but due to the lateness of the hour was not read at this meeting. The city clerk was instructed to have copies prepared, one for each councilman, for study.

A request for permission to remove a pepper tree at 1923 Arlington avenue, was referred to Councilman J. E. Hitchcock, chairman of the street department committee.

Walteria school principal, Miss Dorothy Smith, wrote to thank the council for its donation of

\$32 for Christmas festivities there. Miss Smith also called the attention of the council to the need for a school crossing guard on the state highway.

The city council received a bill from the Long Beach board of education for the city's pro rata share of the expenses of James L. Beebe and Mr. McKesson's trip to Washington in behalf of municipalities and school districts in the matter of securing federal grants for projects. The bill amounting to \$116 was allowed.

The report of the meeting of property owners on El Prado who protested against removal of trees on that thoroughfare was received and placed on file.

City Engineer Frank Leonard reported that an expenditure of \$500 would be required to place two 10-inch pipes under the P. E. tracks at Cabrillo and Carson streets, and to build two manholes, for the control of flood water at that corner. Mr. Leonard was authorized to ask the P. E. company for the necessary permission.
