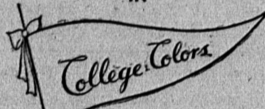

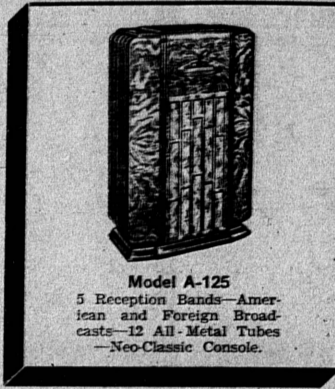

Torrance Will Receive \$15,074.96 From Utility Company This Year

C. C. Bartlett, district manager of the Southern California Edison Company Ltd., announced today that the 1935-36 tax bill of his company for the support of county, municipal and district governments in the 11 southern and central counties which it serves will amount, in round figures, to \$3,650,000. This means that the Edison Company is paying local taxes at the rate of \$10,000 for every day in the year to the communities it serves with electricity.

In making this announcement Mr. Bartlett issued the following statement: "Out of a total bill for local taxes for the fiscal year 1935-36, amounting to approximately \$3,650,000, our company is today making payments of \$3,150,000, leaving \$500,000 to pay as a second installment at a later date. The tax bill paid today includes full payment for the year on personal property and in many instances covers the complete municipal bill for the year. This huge payment takes no account of the large amount of money we shall have to pay to local governments in the form of franchises to use streets, corporation franchise tax to the state, and federal taxes. Based on 1934 operations these last three taxes exceeded \$1,500,000.

"The total tax in Los Angeles county for the year, inclusive of municipalities, school districts and other districts therein, will be \$2,302,387.00. The city of Torrance will receive \$15,074.96. "The payments now made into these local treasuries are in consequence of the new tax system adopted by the people June 27, 1933, and generally referred to as the Riley-Stewart plan. Prior to the adoption of this plan our taxes were paid directly to the state, taking the form of a percentage of our gross operating earnings.

"Our company believes that the payment of its property taxes locally in the great number of communities it serves, thus tending to reduce considerably the burden of a local taxation upon all property owners, will be satisfactory to the people. We are happy to feel that a real working partnership in tax matters is thus established between the company and all who pay taxes to local governments. The \$3,150,000 paid at this time will of course be segregated by public officials. Each community and each governmental unit in which we own property will receive its proportionate share.

"The Riley-Stewart system is not only new but intricate and complex, and it is quite generally admitted by those who have given the subject thought that a number of its provisions as well as certain administrative interpretations require clarification. This will be of assistance in guiding the board of equalization, which assesses utility property, and also to the benefit of all taxpayers. There is only one method by which tests and clarifications can be achieved, which is by the payment of these taxes under a more or less technical protest. While we have filed such protests, it should be understood that they do not in any manner interfere with the use of this money to meet the costs of our local governments. Any adjustments resulting from such protests would be reflected in future years."

Mrs. Bertha Wilcox, clerk of the Inglewood township justice court at Torrance and Redondo Beach, was taken to the Jared Sidney Torrance Memorial hospital this morning, where she underwent an emergency operation for a ruptured appendix. Mrs. Wilcox is resting today as well as can be expected. The attack came upon her very suddenly as she had been on duty as usual yesterday.
