Bids Asked on Cut-Off Link on Coast Highway

Bids for the construction of a new two-mile cut-off link of the Coast highway at the eastern end of the Pinos Verdes hills will be opened July 16 by the

state highway commission, it was announced today.

Estimated to cost approximately \$175,000, the work will involve the cutting of a new roadway along the edge of Royal Palms golf course on the western edge of San Pedro, through property owned by the Sepulveda interests. The county council recently was authorized to prepare a condemnation action to obtain the necessary

right of way, and will be filed shortly in superior court.

The Coast highway will extend into 25th street in San Pedro, just north of Fort McArthur, and will make it unnecessary to travel several miles to the north and make several hairpin turns in order to enter San Pedro from the northwest corner.

Federal funds are being obtained for the construction, under the farm-to-market projects,

several of which already have been constructed in the county.
