3 tablespoons butter
3 tablespoons sugar
1 egg, beaten
1 tablespoon cream
1 cup flour

Men Love Ham For Breakfast

Ham 'n' Apple is a versatile dish, making a grand hearty breakfast, or, with somewhat larger servings of ham, being eminently suitable for dinner. Ham, as you know, is widely acceptable and men particularly relish it for almost any meal. As a matter of fact the dish given below is a typical man's meal, and few husbands could resist praising your culinary skill after the first bite. The menu given lends itself well to the Sunday morning breakfast when time and commuter's schedules are forgotten.

SUNDAY BREAKFAST
Halves of Grapefruit
Ham 'n' Apple
Crumb Coffee Cake
Apricot Jam
Coffee

HAM 'N' APPLE
1 large center slice of ham, 1/2-inch thick
1 cupful sugar
1 teaspoon of dry mustard
1 tart apple for each serving
Trim off all the fat and cut the slice of ham into 5 or 6 suitable sized pieces for serving. Cut the fat into small cubes. Arrange the pieces of ham in the bottom of a shallow baking dish, with the bits of fat scattered in between. Mix the sugar and mustard and sprinkle over all. Wash and core the apples but do not peel them; cut each one in halves crosswise and place outside down on the sugar. Bake in a moderately hot oven (400 degrees) for 45 minutes, or until the apples are done when tested with a fork. The ham will be tender, surrounded with a thick, delicious syrup, topped with apples that are permeated with a wonderful flavor. I usually prepare 2 or 3 apple halves for each serving.

Food Costs To Go Up If Sales Tax Is Repealed

Cattleman Points Out Dangers If Single Tax Is Enacted

With 87 millions of acres of uplands and rough sections in California used largely for livestock grazing, it is easy to see what the single tax on land will do to food costs, according to J. A. McNaughton, vice president and general manager of the Los Angeles Union Stock Yards. McNaughton, who represents the views of California cattle-men as a whole, emphatically de-fied anyone to look into the real facts of the Ralston amend-ment on the November ballot and vote sales tax repeal in his own interests. He made the statement today to the California Committee Against the Single Tax, prefacing his declar-ation by saying that at first he, too, might be led into vot-ing repeal of the sales tax, not realizing that it would boom-erang with the single tax on land and that a vote for one was a vote for the other.

"We have 12 1/2 million acres of irrigated and productive land in the state and about 87 mil-lion acres of uplands and rough sections used largely for live-stock grazing. This grazing land of itself useless at this time for any other purpose, cannot carry the tax impost but the livestock using it must, and higher prices to the consumer will result.

"If our land is overtaxed then it will cease to produce, hence we will have to go outside the state for our food supplies, and finally by reason of the tax de-linquencies the land goes into the hand of the state.

"Under the single tax plan, the taxes upon the land would so greatly increase the cost of food production as to become a very serious burden upon the people.

"California in my estimation is in the process of a great natural development which means prosperity to the people of the state.

"I have faith in the people of this state and believe that they will see the matter in the proper light and overwhelmingly defeat this proposed legislation as has been done on six different oc-casions when the subject was presented on its merits and without a smoke screen such as we have in this case."

Hollandaise Sauce Varies

An interesting variation of Hollandaise sauce is the recipe given below. It was originated for use whenever the usual one is appropriate, and it makes a very thin sauce. Also given is an attractive menu for a large family in which this new Hol-landaise sauce is used.

FESTIVE FOR THE FAMILY
Halves of Grapefruit
Broiled Rib Lamb Chops
Green Lima's with Tomato Hollandaise
French Rolls; Reheated
Youngberry Jam
White Cup Cakes
Sliced Fresh Figs
Coffee Milk

TOMATO-HOLLANDAISE SAUCE
1/2 cupful (1 cube) of butter
Yolks of 2 eggs

1 tablespoonful lemon juice
1 teaspoonful of salt
Few grains of cayenne
1 1/2 cupfuls of tomato juice

Divide the butter into 3 pieces. Put one piece in a saucepan or double boiler with the egg yolks and lemon juice, and stir over hot (not boiling) water until the butter begins to melt. Add the second piece of butter, continu-ing to stir, and, as it thickens, add the third piece, lifting the pan from the water occasionally to keep the sauce from getting too hot and curdling. Add the salt, cayenne and tomato juice last, and let stand over hot water until ready to serve.

NEVER FAIL CAKE

1 cup sugar
2 eggs, beat and fill cup with milk
1 1/2 cups sifted flour
3 tablespoons butter
2 teaspoons vanilla
2 teaspoons baking powder

Method: Mix all together and bake in moderately hot oven.

The outcome of this election will decide whether this nation is to go forward the next four years or plunge backward. Of course, I am going right down the line with President Roosevelt."

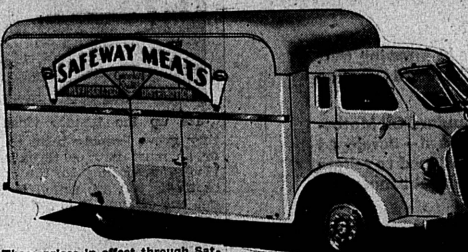
