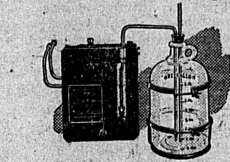

ORDINANCE NO. 284

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE REGULATING HOG RANCHES, THE SANITATION THEREOF, TRANSPORTATION AND DISPOSITION OF GARBAGE IN CONNECTION THEREWITH, AND PRESCRIBING THE DUTIES OF OFFICERS AND PERSONS CARRYING THE PROVISIONS HEREOF INTO EFFECT.

The City Council of the City of Torrance does ordain as follows:

Section 1. Definitions.

(a) The word "person" as used herein shall be construed to mean any person, firm, company, association or corporation, their agents or employees.

(b) The term "live stock inspector" shall be construed to mean the City Official or other person from time to time designated by the City Council by resolution or otherwise as such inspector.

(c) The word "garbage" as used herein shall be construed to mean all animal and vegetable waste matter originating in markets, houses, kitchens, restaurants, and hotels that shall have been prepared for or intended to be used as food or shall have resulted from the preparation of food.

(d) The term "hog ranch" shall be construed to mean any place where hogs are raised, kept or fed for commercial purposes.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to own, control, conduct, maintain, or operate any hog ranch in the City of Torrance, County of Los Angeles, State of California, without a permit from the City Council of the City of Torrance. The fee for such permit shall be \$12.00 per annum, payable annually in advance to the City Clerk. All permits shall run from July 1 of each year.

No fee shall be charged for a permit for the transportation of garbage hereunder by the person who owns, controls, conducts, maintains or operates a hog ranch in the City of Torrance and such transportation is for hogs owned, controlled or raised by him as aforesaid. All other persons transporting garbage for hogs in the City of Torrance shall pay a license fee of \$12.00 per annum, payable annually, in advance, to the City Clerk, commencing July 1 of each year.

The City Council shall issue permits for hog ranches only if it shall find that the laws and ordinances of the City of Torrance and the rules and regulations of the live stock inspector affecting the location, construction, equipment and maintenance in a sanitary manner of premises, buildings, equipment and establishments for feeding hogs are being complied with and that the operation of such hog ranches will comport with the public health, peace, sanitation and safety.

Section 3. The Live Stock Inspector shall, from time to time, with the approval of the City Council, expressed by resolution or otherwise, prescribe rules and regulations to control the transportation and disposal of garbage intended for consumption by hogs, and the location, construction and maintenance of hog ranches.

Section 4. Any person desiring to convey or transport garbage for hogs aforesaid upon or along any public highway in the City of Torrance, or desiring to own, control, conduct, maintain or operate any hog ranch in said City shall first make application to said live stock inspector. Said live stock inspector shall make an investigation to determine that all garbage shall be transported in water tight, metal tanks with close fitting covers, and that all garbage conveying tanks shall be cleaned and disinfected at least once daily when in use, and/or shall make an investigation to determine whether or not the location of the proposed hog ranch is satisfactory and that all rules and regulations applicable to the construction and location and maintenance of the hog ranch and the feeding, keeping and caring for hogs can be complied with. The live stock inspector shall recommend to the City Council whether or not in his opinion a permit should be issued to applicant.

Section 5. Any permit issued hereunder may be suspended by the live stock inspector where

the location or conduct of such hog ranch has become a nuisance or said inspector finds that the same does not comport with the public peace, health, sanitation and safety, or that said permittee has violated the laws of the State of California, the provisions of this ordinance or the rules and regulations of the live stock inspector approved as aforesaid. Said live stock inspector shall, at the next regular meeting of the City Council, submit the facts upon which he bases the suspension of such license to the City Council, and said City Council shall thereupon determine the facts, and if the Council finds that the facts submitted by the live stock inspector are true, it shall thereupon revoke the permit issued and therefor suspended by such live stock inspector. During the period of suspension aforesaid, the live stock inspector shall permit said hogs to be fed and cared for under such conditions as shall be prescribed in the rules and regulations approved as aforesaid by the City Council.

Section 6. All construction work hereunder and/or said rules and regulations, must conform with the requirements specified therein and shall be installed under the supervision of the live stock inspector.

Plans for the location, construction, improvement, remodeling, repair, and installation of garbage feeding floors, water troughs, wash racks, retaining vats, food, bone and refuse platforms must be submitted to the live stock inspector for approval before construction or work thereon is commenced.

Section 7. If any section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portion of this ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed this ordinance, each section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause or phrase thereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivisions, sentences, clauses or phrases be held invalid or unconstitutional.

Section 8. Any person violating any of the provisions hereof shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$500.00 or imprisonment in the City Jail of the City of Torrance, or County Jail of the County of Los Angeles for a period of not to exceed six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment. Each violation hereof shall be construed to be a separate offense.

Section 9. The City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this ordinance by the City Council, shall cause the same to be published by one insertion in the Torrance Herald, a weekly newspaper of general circulation, published and circulated in the City of Torrance, and thereupon and thereafter the same shall be in full force and effect.

Passed and adopted by the City Council of the City of Torrance, signed and approved by the Mayor of said City and attested by the City Clerk of said City, this 14th day of July, 1936.

Siren Song of Quail and Venison Draws Cash From Harbor Gourmets

Prominent business men of Lomita, San Pedro and the harbor area, are organizing a new club this week, the membership of which will be very select. Meetings are to be strictly closed to outsiders and the ritual will consist of weeping, wailing and gnashing of teeth, with consolation prizes at each meeting to the best gnasher.

A few days ago, one Bill Russell, who gave his true name to Judge Frank R. Carrell, of the Inglewood township justice court at Gardena, as Walter William Russell, approached the aforesaid business men with a nifty proposition.

Needs Finances
"I have a lot of quail and venison in storage," said Russell, "and I need some dough to get it out. If you will finance me to the extent of a dollar and a half, or such a matter, I will deal you out some of the choice pieces."

Bob Ueda, prominent Japanese rancher and head of the Japanese Association in these parts, was one who listened to Russell's bobwhite song and gave him \$1.50. C. J. Kurtz, also of Lomita, was another victim, and many others, who supplied sums ranging from \$1.25 to \$5.00. Russell took the money and departed. The financiers waited patiently and with anxious palates for several days.

Law Takes a Hand
Russell failed to show up and Ueda and Kurtz proceeded to lay their grievances before the law, with the result that Russell was rounded up in an auto court at 24705 So. Main street. His tale of quail meat and venison it is alleged was just one of those things.

When arraigned on July 10 he pled not guilty, but on July 13 he had changed his mind and was allowed to change his plea to guilty, whereupon Judge Carrell gave him a fine of \$100 or 50 days in the county jail on each complaint alleging petty theft. Since he was unable to pay, a commitment was issued and Russell will spend the next 100 days in jail, his sentences being ordered to run consecutively.

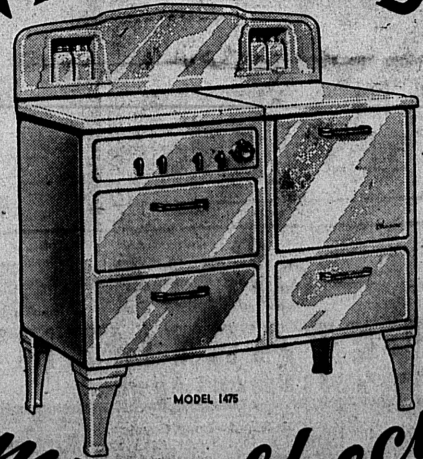
