George Brent's Real Life Experiences Top His Film Roles for Excitement

There are many screen actors who have never come closer to real adventure than in their celluloid exploits. George Brent, co-starred with Madeleine Carroll in the English screen star's first American picture, Walter Wanger's "The Case Against Mrs. Ames," is distinctly not one of them.

"The Case Against Mrs. Ames" comes to the Plaza Theatre, Hawthorne, on Friday. In it, Brent is cast as a ruthless assistant district attorney who does his best to send Miss Carroll, beautiful widow of a slain socialite, to the gallows for murder.

It is a dramatic part. But no more dramatic than some of the incidents of Brent's real life.

Born in Dublin, Ireland, son of a newspaperman father, Brent worked as a sailor for two years on freighters off the Cornish coast. From this he jumped to a job as a sheep herder, work in a diamond mine, and work as a blacksmith. In the National University at Dublin he played football and baseball.

The Irish rebellion was just the kind of thing Brent had been hoping for. He jumped in to it heart and soul, becoming a dispatch bearer for Michael Collins and later a rebel secret service agent. He served for two years, when Ireland began to get too warm.

Forced to flee, he chose the most illogical of countries for refuge. He fled to England. England began to get warm,

and Brent took a freighter to Canada. He drifted to New York. He admits that he became "the next thing to a hobo" for the next few years. Then he got a stock company job at Elitche's Garden, Denver, became leading man, moved to other companies, organized six of his own, and in a short time had played 300 leading roles.

He appeared on Broadway in John Golden's "Those We Love," then climbed quickly to tops and Hollywood.

"The Case Against Mrs. Ames" gives the fiery actor a chance to do some of his best work. Cramped with dramatic action, it suits his taste.

Featured players supporting the co-stars in the picturization of the Arthur Somers Roche novel include Arthur Treacher, Alan Baxter, Beulah Bondi, Alan Mowbray, Brenda Fowler, Esther Dale, Edward Brophy, Richard Carle and Scotty Beckett.

Kay Francis In Role of War Nurse

Undersea Picture Wired For Thrills

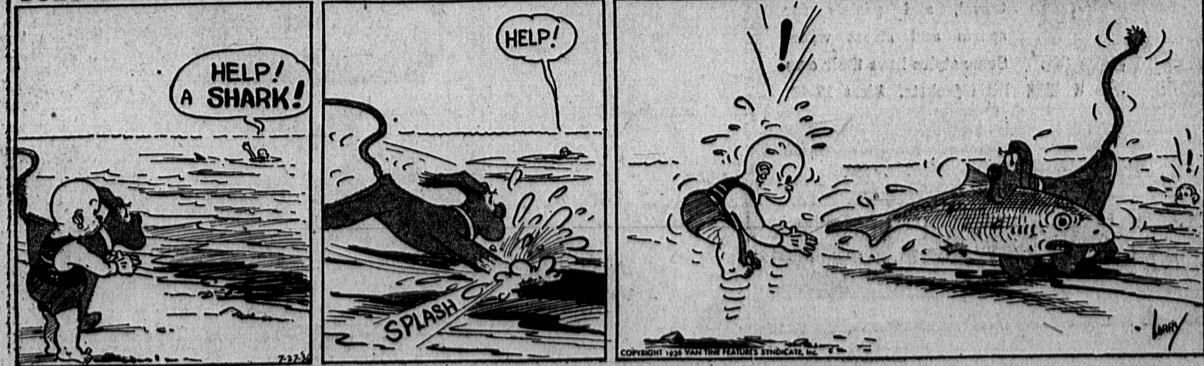
