This Crepe Paper "Straw" Is a Fashion Favorite



FOR all its charm, this hat called THE WALTZ, is just a tight-fitting cap crocheted of crepe paper. Using twisted strips of crepe that work up like yarn, you can make this hat in a few hours. The crepe is durable, and a hat in any of the new styles can be made from one fifteen-cent fold of paper.

This one is made of white, but new fashion colors are now available in crepe paper. Blue, honey-green are a few. A matching bag and belt set can be crocheted from another fold of crepe paper.

For crocheting, cut strips of crepe 1/2 inch wide across the grain. Stretch and twist these by hand or with an inexpensive gadget called a twister. Use No. 3 steel crochet hook. The stitch throughout is: * ch 1, skip 1, s c under ch of previous row, repeat row.*

Here are the directions for a 2 1/2-inch head size: Ch 3, join in loop with sl st. Row 1, 7 s c in loop. Row 2, 8 s c in 1st st, * ch 1, s c in next st, repeat from *. Row 3, Cr in pattern, increasing in every other st, that is—1 s c in 1st st, ch 1, 1 s c in next st, ch 1. Continue in pattern, increasing enough to keep work flat until work measures 2 1/2 inches in diameter. Let thread hang. Mark center front and center back. Add following short rows: pick up at 1 1/2 inches at right of center front and cr. in pattern 1 1/2 inches beyond center. Break thread. Repeat at back, starting 1 1/2 inches at left of center back and cr. 1 1/2 inches beyond center mark. Break thread. Pick up hanging thread and cr around 2 rows. Work should measure 3 1/2 inches from side to side and 1 1/2 inches from front to back. Continue without increasing 3/4 inch. Work around to center back. This makes the collar for the small crown. Increase 1 st in every 4th row. Make 6 increases, spacing them evenly around crown. Rows 3-7, Cr without increasing. Row 8, 6 increases. Row 9, Cr without increasing. Row 10, 8 increases. Continue without increasing until crown measures 3 1/2 inches from bottom of collar to lower edge. * Let thread hang at center back, pick up at 1 inch from center back, and cr to within 3 inches of center front. Break thread. Pick up hanging thread and cr without increasing until crown measures 4 1/4 inches at right side and 4 1/4 inches at center front, back and left side.

Trim with flowers and veil. Your hat may be made moisture-proof with the application of an inexpensive water repellent solution.

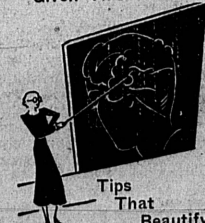

THE PROBLEM OF SUMMER PERMANENTS

Heat, coupled with swimming, tennis and other summer activities, often dries and burns the hair. In the proper application of the permanent wave at such times, the hair should first have a special oil treatment to soften and temper it even before the cleansing oil is applied. A good cleansing oil should then be used to assure the hair's taking the wave properly. The least dirt remaining in the hair or scalp may cause it to fail to take the wave and the value of the treatment is lost.

Following the steam process another oil should be applied to replenish the natural oils removed by the steam and heat of the waving process.
