**New Rules Given On Modernization**

There is now published and available in a single booklet all Title I Modernization and Repair Regulations and Amendments" according to W. G. Bingham, associate director, Federal Housing Administration for Southern California district. The regulations became effective on July 20, 1936. No change of importance has been made in regulations, previously in effect, other than to clarify their meaning.

Associate Director Bingham points out that a tremendous market exists for the financing of repairs, alterations, and additions to real property of all kinds, which he estimates as exceeding one billion dollars per year. The Federal Housing Administration is ready and willing to insure as large a volume of this business as can be justified by reasonable credit stand-
