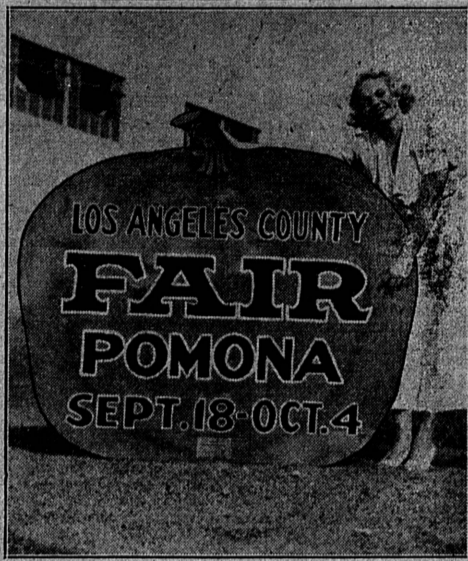
BENZELS VACATION IN THE NORTH
