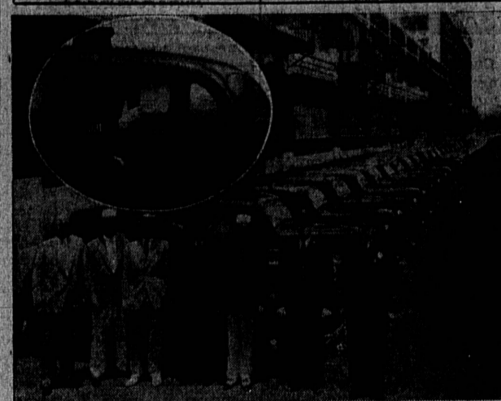

Zamperini Race Best Feature of Olympic Games for L. A. Writer

From Cliff Johnson, the Herald's Los Angeles correspondent, comes a word of praise for Louis Zamperini, who earned the right to be considered the greatest distance man in the United States by his performance last Friday. Johnson voices the feeling of Louie's friends here when he says the kid did not let his sponsors down and should have ample recognition when he comes home.

He says: "The whole feature of the Olympic Games that I've enjoyed most was the fact that Louis Zamperini beat Lash out by six places in the 5000 meter run.

"Have watched for that race ever since I read the stories in your paper about his rise in athletics, how the chamber of commerce gave him the send-off to New York, with the bag with the tell-tale label of the chamber of commerce, and his race to tie Lash in the final national tryouts.

"Then, sports writers picked Lash to beat Zamperini, in dispatches from Berlin, and finally when the race is run, he comes in, not first, but beats Lash just the same.

"All most of us care about is that the U. S. wins an event, and that the winner is a Californian. Louis is too young a runner to be expected to win against the rest of the world, although he certainly would have been acclaimed had he been able to do so.

"I claim he didn't let his sponsors down, and he will no doubt get the reception he is entitled to when he returns. It looks to me that California is about monopolizing the U. S. winners, and no doubt they'll all be honored together at some big event in Los Angeles when they return together."
