MODEL IS LENT TO SHIP SHOW BY ROOSEVELT
TORONTO, Ont. (U.P.)—One of the most highly prized items in President Roosevelt's valuable marine collection, an authentic scale model of the H.M.S. Bounty, famed British "mutiny" vessel, will be exhibited at the Canadian National Exhibition hobby show this year.
The model, complete as to body lines, rigging and furnishings, is based upon the actual plans of the H.M.S. Bounty, which are still kept in the archives of the British Admiralty.
The Roosevelt collection of ship models is recognized by collectors as one of the most valuable on the continent. The H.M.S. Bounty model is insured for \$10,000.

Metropolitan Water District Tax Rate Up

Increase of 17 Cents Adopted at Last Meeting of Directors

Torrance and other member cities of the Metropolitan water district of Southern California were formally notified this week that the tax levy for 1936-37 would be 37 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation, for cities that rely entirely upon taxes.

The new rate of 37 cents is comparable with last year's levy of 20 cents. The 85 percent increase is necessary to pay interest on huge blocks of bonds sold to finance construction of the \$220,000,000 aqueduct that is expected to be ready to bring Colorado river water to Los Angeles and Orange counties two years hence.
The levy also will permit the water district to repay to the city of Los Angeles approximately \$1,000,000 advanced to finance early work on the water supply system. Not all of the 10 member cities in Los Angeles county have paid their previous levies out of taxes, it was stated. Glendale paid its entire levy out of earnings of its water and power department, while Compton paid half of its levy in that manner last year.

Pays the Workers
For each dollar collected this year from the district's 37-cent levy, there will be about \$4.50 of aqueduct bond money paid to men given employment thru aqueduct construction, it was estimated. During the year, about \$50,000,000 will be invested in aqueduct construction, \$20,000,000 of which goes directly into pay-rolls for workmen drawn from the 13 member cities. Another \$12,000,000 is going to industrial workers making the materials and equipment used on the big job.

Torrance Benefits

Toy Library Service May Be Expanded

County Probation Department Will Cooperate in the Work

Expansion of the county coordinating council's children's toy loan library service from 10 to 30 branches will be effected through cooperation of the county probation department with the rehabilitation division of the charities department, it was announced today.

Toy libraries loan toys to under privileged children who have no other means of acquiring them, and they are located in city playgrounds, public schools, public libraries and community centers.
Purpose of the libraries is to keep juvenile delinquency at a minimum by keeping younger children off the streets, and according to Kenyon J. Scudder, county probation officer, the plan has worked out so well where it has been tried that it has been decided to expand it. Single men now on county relief rolls will be obtained to repair and maintain the toys, while W.P.A. workers will be utilized by the probation department to man the libraries, according to tentative plans.

Hollywoodings

The production was directed by Frank Capra who returned this week from a three weeks' vacation in the Thousand Islands to oversee the editing of the film.

Dorothy Arzner is the only woman director in pictures. Calm and efficient in her work she presents strange contrast to the hair-tearing raving male directors as they are thought of by the public. At present Dorothy is directing Columbia's picture of George Kelly's Pulitzer prize play "Craig's Wife," starring Rosalind Russell, John Boles and Billie Burke.

Seven years ago, Bruce Sidney was producing and directing his own two-reel comedies at St. Petersburg, Florida. Today Bruce is receiving \$10 a day for his services as an extra on the Samuel Goldwyn lot. Some tumble and Bruce says: "Sound did it."

"Dodsworth," screen adaptation of the Sinclair Lewis novel, was completed this week at the Samuel Goldwyn studios. The film brings Walter Huston, who played the role on the stage, and Ruth Chatterton together in the lead parts.

Produced at an expense of \$1,000,000, screen right alone amounted to \$160,000. Sets used in the production were among the most elaborate of the year, and were designed by Academy award winner, Richard Day.

An exact sized duplicate of the deck of the new Atlantic liner "Queen Mary" furnished the background for some of the scenes, while the script necessitated also the building of an entire Italian villa, life size.

MAMMAL FOSSIL CALLED 180 MILLION YEARS OLD
JOHANNESBURG. (U.P.)—A fossil believed to be between 170,000,000 and 180,000,000 years old has been unearthed by a party of museum collectors at Tarkastad.

Dr. Robert Broom, noted South Africa scientist, declares the fossil is in a nearly perfect state. It belongs to a group of cold-blooded vegetarian mammal-like reptiles known as the Kannemeyeria. It is shaped like a tortoise and eight feet in length, and is believed to have had large tusks and probably a scaly skin like a fish.

Dr. Broom believes the specimen may be an entirely new species of a group of mammals that roamed about South Africa in bygone ages.
