If Kirkpatrick does enter the Trojan school, he should become one of the world's greatest hurdlers, under the coaching of Dean Cromwell.

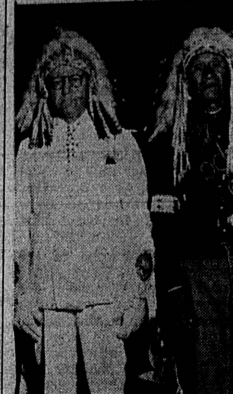
Sport Shots... As Seen Through the Smoke of My Pipe

### Second Annual Field Meet to Be Held Soon

Boys of All Ages Will Compete in Three Divisions At Local Park

Another field day for boys of the community similar to the successful event staged last year will be run off at the municipal park on Saturday afternoon, Aug. 29, under the direction of Dale Riley, playground director, and Pete Zamperini.

Events will be staged in three divisions, midgets, juniors and seniors, for boys of all ages. The exponent system of grading will be used, which places a contestant in a division according to his age, weight and height.

Events in the midget class will include the 50-yard dash, standing broad jump, base running (indoor baselines), five-pound shot put, baseball throw for distance, indoor baseball throw for accuracy, football punt. Events in the junior division are 75-yard dash, standing broad jump, indoor base running, eight-pound shot put, baseball throw for distance, indoor baseball throw for accuracy, football throw for distance.

Seniors will compete in the 100-yard dash, standing broad jump, base running, regulation bases, 12-pound shot put, baseball throw for distance, football throw for accuracy, and football throw for accuracy.

Last year over 400 boys competed and the second annual event is expected to draw many more entries.

Medals will be awarded to the winning contestants. The meet will start with an Olympic parade before the grandstand at 1 o'clock and the contestants will take the Olympic oath.

### Zamperini Shows Lash the Way Home In British Empire Meet

Before a crowd of 90,000 people at White City Stadium in London, England, Louis Zamperini wound up this season's running by taking third in the three-mile run in the British Empire-United States exhibition meet last Saturday.

Jack Lovelock, the New Zealand 1500-meter champion, was first in 14:14.2, with Alexander Burns of England second, 14:26.4. Louis put on his usual flashing finish to take third in 14:37.2, and Don Lash, of Indiana, was fourth in 14:42.2. Peter Ward, of England, and Stanley Wudvika, of Philadelphia, were fifth and sixth.

This may complete the local boy's foreign tour, and he with other members of the United States Olympic team will be sailing for home within a few days. The exact date of his arrival in Torrance is not yet known, and will have to wait on the news of his sailing from England.

Any lingering doubt as to Louie's right to be named the champion long distance runner in the United States must be set at rest now with his second clean cut victory over Don Lash, who received the popular title before the distance races in Berlin were run off. Lash was fourth in Saturday's race by a full five seconds, approximately 25 yards.

The time in Saturday's race which was 188 yards short of the 5000-meter Olympic distance, was slow as compared with the time in the finals at Berlin when the Torrance boy was clocked in 14:46.8.

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**Redondo Beach Taxes Reduced**
