Johannes Poulsen's "Everyman", Premiere In Hollywood Bowl, Sept. 10; Chosen 1936 Successor to "Midsummer Night's Dream"

This second spectacular offering of the association will be presented on the same lavish scale as its elaborately produced forerunner, "A Midsummer Night's Dream," Max Reinhardt triumph which thrilled Bowl audiences two seasons ago.
