On Saturday, August 29, all high school graduates who will enroll in the junior college will assemble in the administration building for the guidance examination.

Students of the fourteenth year will register at the college on Tuesday, Sept. 8, and those of thirteenth year on Thursday, Sept. 10. Wednesday, Sept. 9, admission day, is a legal school holiday.
