Shows Increase of 68.5% In Home Mortgage Loans

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 31. (Special)—An increase of 68.5 percent in home mortgage loans made by the American Mutual Building and Loan Association of Redondo Beach and accepted for insurance by the Federal Housing Administration during July, was reported here today by George E. Palmer, in charge of savings, building and loan activities as special assistant to the administrator. "This is represented by 11 loans made by this association and accepted for insurance, totaling \$55,800 as of Aug. 1," said Mr. Palmer. "This compares with a total of \$33,100 on July 1. As an indication of the residential building activity in the general community of Redondo Beach, it is interesting to note that all of these loans were for the construction of new homes. "Savings, building and loan associations nationally have steadily been increasing their activities in co-operation with the Federal Housing Administration. During the past month they added \$6,456,035 to their total of loans accepted by the administrator, bringing their grand total to \$63,096,231. This is 17.07 percent of all the business done by the F.H.A. thru all of the approved lending institutions. There are now 583 of these associations active in this program."
