It is interesting to note the number of Torrance mothers who are taking the art of child training in a serious manner, as well they should, since on the early training of our children depends the future of our nation. Several are entering the Mothers' Educational Center Paidology Club, which opens its season today under the direction of Dr. Maude Wilde, founder of the center. Meetings the first and third Thursday of each month in the lecture hall, 1170 South Hill street. At the end of the season diplomas are issued to those mothers completing the course in child training.

Child Problems

Thumbsucking is one of the problems that make mothers gray. This was ably discussed at today's meeting by Miss Eleanor Magnusson, who gave directions for prevention of the habit. Dr. Maude Wilde gave tips on spending the family income, and Miss Zora Huddleston talked on milk.

Torrance Mothers' Educational Center is a division of the Paidology Club, is financed by Torrance Chamber of Commerce and is in charge of the child welfare department of the Torrance Woman's Club. Mrs. Ruth Rogers, acting chairman, is assisted by Mrs. Lillian Barrington, Mrs. Maude Lock and Mrs. Velma Schultz. Three doctors come out from the center to each meeting and check the weight and height of the children enrolled. A general checkup is given every fourth month. Meetings are held in the Woman's Club clubhouse the fourth Friday of each month from 9 to 11:30 a. m. Positively no child will be registered after 11:30 a. m.

CUISINE NEWSSETTES

ITALIAN SQUASH WITH HAMBURGER

1 Medium onion cut fine
1 Tsp. chile powder
2 Lbs. hamburger
1 Tsp. butter
2 Lbs. Italian squash
1 Can tomato sauce
Pepper and salt to taste
Fry onion in butter until brown. Add hamburger, fry until all separated and brown, salt and pepper, sprinkle chile, add tomato sauce, cut the end off squash, cut those string style, add last, and simmer until squash is done.

SOUR CREAM CAKE (Basic Recipe)

2 Cups sugar
1 Cup butter or other shortening
2 Eggs
1 Cup sour milk
4 Cups flour
1/2 to 1 tsp. soda, according to sourness of milk
Flavor to taste
Cream shortening, add sugar a little at a time, creaming after each addition. Add eggs beaten separately, milk and flour with soda in the flour. Then flavor to taste, and beat the mixture well. Bake in oven 350° F. This can be used as basic recipe for many cakes, and will stay moist several days.

LEMON MILK SHERBET

Juice and rind of 3 lemons; 2 cups of sugar; mix together
2 Egg yolks (beaten)
2 Egg whites (beaten)
1 Qt. milk
Place the above ingredients in the order given in an ice cream freezer, preferably the paddle type freezer, and freeze until stiff.

CHEESE SOUFFLE

2 Cups cracker crumbs
3 Eggs
1 Cup cheese
Salt
Mix the beaten egg yolks, cheese, cracker crumbs, milk and salt together. Fold in beaten egg whites. Place in buttered baking dish and bake in pan of hot water at 350° F. until firm in the center.

SPANISH DRESSING

Mix together
1/2 Cup oil
1/2 Cup lemon juice
1/2 Cup sugar
1/2 Cup chili sauce
1/2 Onion grated. Put all in bottle. Add a garlic clove. Keep in ice refrigerator. Shake well before using.

BAKED APPLES DE LUXE

Apples
Lemon juice
1 Cup sugar
1/2 Cup water
1/2 Cup Maraschino or fruit juice
Peel and core apples and rub with lemon juice. Place in a syrup made of the sugar, water and fruit juice. Cover and simmer till tender, turning often. Remove and fill center with apricot marmalade and chopped walnuts. Serve cold with whipped cream.
