Chanel's fall collection expresses individuality without exaggeration, and marks definite contribution to the new mode. This individuality is expressed equally in fabrics and colors. An extremely wearable and successful tailleur is in brown cross-barred tulle over taffeta, which gives the impression of an entirely new fabric. Another is a wool lace afternoon dress in ardoise blue with collar facing and wide wrapped girde of wine colored crepe romaine. One handsome dinner dress of heavy black lace has a vest with long sleeves and high neck finished with a turn down collar. This has a peplum of light blue stiffened net. Another evening dress of close-meshed silk lace has a wide band at the side closing of Irish lace faced with magenta and a sash belt of old gold provides interesting color contrast.

Color Combination

LeLong's collection especially stresses striped tulle. One gown is made in two layers of electric blue and violet tulle over a light violet slip. This is his modern interpretation of the gown he made for one of the stars in Mollere's "Ecole Des Femmes." These same two colors are repeated in a full skirted lace dress with alternate bands of these colors which become increasingly wide toward the hem. A dinner suit of midnight blue broadcloth has a gold lace blouse with a jabot. The sleeves of the suit have ruffles of the lace down to the elbow at the outside seam.

Molyneux in his opening of fers dresses of two materials—the front half of one fabric and the back of another. Examples of this are the combinations of broadcloth and velvet in some dresses and black taffeta and lace in others.

He launches the chemise type of dresses for both day and evening. Dinner dresses of ankle length have fur bordering at the bottom. He has flat tunic effects chiefly in evening dresses as in a black embroidered net tunic gown with the back skirt in two tiers. This silhouette is carried out in green lace among other fabrics, and he also uses black net for shoulder straps and decolletage facings. This is most effective when used on white. He shows many amusing head-dresses such as a small velvet bow at the side front of a tulle or lace band or others with bows at the back.
