Razzle-Dazzle Plays With Undersized Team To Be Tried

By STEVE SNIDER United Press Staff Correspondent CHAMPAIGN, Ill. (U.P.)—A stadium full of clever backs and pass receiving ends, spells just one thing to Bob Zupke, so let the Big Ten be warned it faces another barrage of mystifying footballs from his 24th Illinois eleven.

The 1936 Illini must pass in self defense. It will take all the famous genius that devised the razzle-dazzle, tying trapeze the flea flicker and other bounding variations to keep the undersized Illinois squad from a quick death in the Western conference.

From the team that won only three games last season went four key figures—Capt. Chuck Galbreath and Arvo Antilla, tacklers, Eddie Gryboski, a guard and voted the most valuable player, and Les Lindberg, punting halfback.

Rugged Material Available Zupke has chosen to fill these vacancies with sophomores who can turn the Illini into a championship contender. These second year men are the first rugged players Zup has laid his hands on for several years.

Only one sophomore likely will find his way into the veteran backfield, expected to include Wilbur Henry, Lowell Spurgeon, Jewett Cole, Bobby Grieve, Tom Wilson and John Theodore. He is Jay Wardley, Joliet youngster, who is hailed as the greatest forward passing prospect since Jack Beynon.

Wardley will find a half dozen ready targets for his passes. Returning end lettermen include Ken Nelson, Gene Dykstra, and Francis Cantwell, all exceptional receivers.

Headed by Capt. Ed Sayre, 13 lettermen were among a squad of 64 players to report for opening practice Sept. 9.

Lack of Reserves Make Prospect Gloomy This Season, Says Comrada

Loss of 13 lettermen out of a football squad that is never blessed with enough reserve material is enough to make any coach go around talking to himself, but Coach Ben Comrada is taking things as usual slow and easy and is expected to come up with another champion caliber Gauchos outfit when the Marine League season starts.

Of the 18 men lost by graduation at the Narbonne high school, seven were regularly started in every game last year. They are Woods, Powers, Angelich, McQueen, Nietupski, Lupin and Mayer. Captain Mayer, guard; Nietupski, center, and Powers, halfback, made the All-Marine team selected at the close of the season, while McQueen and Lupin were placed on the second team.

Gordon Woods, star quarterback, is the laddyluck who robbed the Tartars of their victory over the Gauchos last fall by putting over a touchdown in the last moment of play, and also distinguished himself in a post-Marine season game against Los Angeles high by running back a kick-off 80 yards.

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Huge Sum Spent By Sportsmen In California

Survey Discloses Total of More Than \$63,000,000 Last Year

SAN FRANCISCO.—The results of a statewide survey to determine annual expenditures of California sportsmen are made public by the Fish & Game Development Association, statewide wildlife conservation body, through its president, Carl F. Johnson. Conducted over a four months' period and in each of the 58 counties of the state, the survey shows that more than \$63,000,000 was spent in California during 1935 by anglers and hunters.

Based on total license sales of slightly less than 400,000 the breakdown of figures reveals that sportsmen spent \$16,916,215 for supplies and wearing apparel; approximately \$10,500,000 for automobile transportation costs and piling up the surprising total mileage of 316,000,000 miles. Sportsmen traveled another 11 million miles by airplane, boat and train.

Hotels, inns, resorts and camps received a total of \$11,245,323 from the sportsmen, while the sporting goods dealer sold \$24,429,203 worth of firearms, rods, tackle, ammunition, and similar equipment. Dealers in automobile tires, accessories, and repairs received approximately \$10,000,000 as their share of the "meat" distributed by the sportsmen.

Fishermen and the hunters of California have a total investment of \$128,984,728 in equipment. Every angler in the state spent on the average of \$116.80 last year, while the hunter, for the same period of time, spent \$115.68. The angler spends \$1.22 every year more than does the hunter.

Last year 235,000 license holders bought both hunting and angling licenses, or 88 percent of the total licenses sold. The ratio between hunting and fishing licenses purchased is 56.3 percent for fishing and 43.7 percent for hunting.
