Savory Sausage Great For Chill Fall Day Meals On chill fall days, sausage in one or more of its homey combinations seems just the thing. For breakfast, there is sausage and buckwheat cakes; for dinner, sausage and boiled potatoes with rich sausage gravy and sauerkraut; and for supper, sausage with waffles and genuine maple syrup. Perhaps it is the spicy flavor of the sausage which makes these combinations so satisfying this time of year. Sausage combines well with many foods, so that its use is by no means limited to the favorites mentioned here. Inez S. Willson, home economist, suggests sausage and noodles in casserole as a coming favorite for the hearty dimer.

Sausage and Noodles In Casserole 2 pounds bulk sausage 1 package medium egg noodles or 2 cups homemade noodles 1 small onion, finely diced 1 cup tomatoes Salt Cook noodles in boiling salted water until tender. Fry into a greased casserole and mix with finely diced onion, brown. Place into patties, and brown. Place tomatoes over all, cover and cook in a moderate oven (350° F.) for 20 minutes.

Electrical Age Exposition Opens Saturday, Oct. 10, In Los Angeles

Wonders of electrical science will take on new practical aspects when the "Electrical Age Exposition" begins its run in Pan-Pacific auditorium, Los Angeles, on Saturday, October 10, officials of the event declared today. Running in connection with the Boulder Dam inaugural celebration the exposition was reported virtually in readiness for its opening. Preparations for spectacular demonstrations, entertainment features, useful applications in the home and gadgets calculated to portray a new electrical age were seen on every side. Workers, technicians and scientists tolled all this week, making ready for the event, which will portray new applications of electricity for domestic, commercial and industrial purposes. One of the features in the entertainment division, will be a revue of attractive girls, garbed as refrigerators, radio sets, fans

and clocks, all portraying in their dance routines the mechanical devices to which electricity has been harnessed. Elaborate preparations for cooking schools and electrical kitchens have been under way for days, officials said. Some of the leading household and culinary experts of the era will have charge of these useful divisions of the exposition. Riot of Color The entire exposition is set in a riotously colorful environment. Designers, decorators and electrical engineers were surveying their work with pleasure. Under direction of the Electrical Development League, consisting of leading electrical houses, laboratories and power distributing bureaus, the show will reveal hundreds of new uses for Boulder power. "Light Parade" In celebration of the new power's arrival, millions of candle power light will be released on Los Angeles downtown streets the night of Oct. 9. "Light On Parade" will be seen on Broadway and Spring streets, and noted speakers will be heard in the civic center before an audience expected to number one million persons.
