Lomita Passes 3000 Mark In Registration

Democrats Predominate in Latest Report From Registrar's Office

Registration in the ten Lomita precincts for the November 3 election totals 3049, it was announced this week by W. M. Kerr, county registrar of voters. The community passes the 3000-mark for the first time.

Of the total, 1997 are registered as Democrats and only 900 as Republicans. There also are 130 who decline to state, 13 socialists, 7 prohibitionists and 2 progressives.

For the August 25 primary election, Lomita had a total of only 2886 registered voters, with 1890 Democrats and 845 Republicans.

On November 6, 1934, for the Merriam-Sinclair election, Lomita had a total registration of 2738, and only had but 8 precincts. There were then 1540 Democrats and 981 Republicans.

Back at the previous presidential election, in November of 1932, Lomita had a total of only 2664 in the eight precincts, with 1163 Democrats to 1192 Republicans. The two major parties then were practically evenly divided, while today one is twice as strong as the other.

Leaders of Electrical Industry Meet for Conclave This Week

Leaders of the electrical industry in Southern California will meet in Hollywood today and tomorrow for the annual fall conclave of the Pacific Coast Electrical Association. More than 350 association members, representing virtually every branch of the electrical business, are to attend the sessions at the Roosevelt hotel. Local representation in the association includes electrical dealers and distributors, contractors and power company officials.

Fred B. Lewis, vice president and general manager of the Southern California Edison Company and president of the coast-wide association, will direct the program of discussion of administrative, operation and sales problems.

Industry Moves Forward
"The electrical industry has moved forward steadily since it first took its place as one of the nation's major industries," Mr. Lewis said. "There have been, however, certain periods of special emphasis when it seemed advisable to pause, take stock of the situation, make some appraisal of new operations and to make any necessary adjustments for another forward step. Today the industry here in Southern California is facing new problems accompanied by opportunities far exceeding anything in its previous history. In the sales branch of our industry we now face a market which has been six years in building, and energetic people with an accumulation of six years' needs are ready and eager to buy electrical equipment to increase the comfort and convenience of their homes and to improve and speed up the work on their farms and in their industries."

Will Visit Exposition
One of the features of the two-day conclave will be the celebration Thursday night of Pacific Coast Electrical Association night at the Electrical Age Exposition in Los Angeles. The exposition, at the Pan-Pacific auditorium, Oct. 10-18, is being held under the sponsorship of the Electrical Development League of Southern California. Many members of the Pacific Coast Electrical Association also are represented in the development league membership. The conclave program has been arranged to omit the customary mid-session dinner meeting to allow the delegates to attend the exposition.

Petition Ready For Filing
With a list of names totaling 1140 signed to the petition requesting the Southern California Gas Company to establish a local office at Lomita the Lomita residents announced this week that the petition was ready and would be submitted to J. F. Murray, division manager of the gas company at Redondo Beach, early this week.

A great amount of interest has been shown by the people of Lomita in furthering the project which they feel to be a well warranted request. In the past Lomita subscribers to the gas service have been forced to drive to the Torrance office when they wished to make any arrangements with the company. Also previously any consumer desiring to pay a bill had to arrange to pay it at the California State bank during the bank's business hours, which are from 10 a. m. to 3 p. m. Local residents said that this was often inconvenient because of the limited hours.

Consumers of gas in the Lomita district exceed 2000 it is said.
