Final Draft From PWA Received

\$12,133 Check Completes Government's Share In Civic Center

Bringing to a close a successful negotiation between the federal government and the city of Torrance of more than a year's duration, City Clerk A. H. Bartlett announced Monday that he had received the final draft for the Public Works Administration's contribution toward the construction of the civic center buildings.

The draft was for \$12,133.20. With the payment of this sum, the federal government's part in the erection of the Torrance city hall and jail, Torrance municipal auditorium and Torrance public library is concluded.

Additional Buildings

Because the national election this week held the attention of all governmental agencies, no further progress is reported toward the construction of the proposed new administration building adjoining the civic auditorium or the new fire hall to replace the present damaged structure on Cravens avenue.

Final approval of a \$4,950 federal grant for the administration building was announced last week by the Public Works Administration in Washington and favorable action is expected soon on the federal grant for the new fire hall. The latter project has run the entire gauntlet of federal offices up to and including the signature of Secretary Ickes. All that is lacking is President Roosevelt's signature. The mandate of the people given the Roosevelt administration Tuesday is a factor that practically assures continuance of the PWA and thus endorsement of the fire hall grant is confidently expected within a few days.

Started Last January

Following approval of a bond issue here to contribute toward the construction cost of the model civic center structures, the contract for their erection was signed Jan. 14. The various building costs were: City hall, \$66,106.72; auditorium, \$62,569.97; and library, \$32,133.09. The PWA contributed approximately 45 percent toward the material and labor costs, the check received by City Clerk Bartlett being the administration's final payment of that grant.
