

Lomita Veteran Takes Life by Gas Poisoning

A victim of carbon monoxide poisoning as result of what authorities believe was a suicide attempt, Charles Fowler Sevier, 45-year-old World war veteran, was found by a neighbor dead in his car in the garage at his home, 25319 Narbonne avenue, Lomita, Nov. 1.

Mr. Sevier, who is survived by his widow, Mrs. Ruth E. Sevier, and four children, was a wharfman for the Associated Oil Company at San Pedro. Funeral services were held at the A. M. Gamby Mortuary in Lomita yesterday afternoon with Rev. John Orr officiating. Interment was in the national cemetery at Sawtelle.

Besides his family, Mr. Sevier is survived by his mother and a sister who reside in San Pedro. He served as sergeant in Company M, of the Eighth Infantry in the A. E. F., and was in France and Germany, where he re-enlisted, from 1917 to 1919. He was born in Weber's Falls, Okla.

A group of veterans assisted at the funeral in tribute to their one-time comrade in arms. Mr. Sevier did not belong to any Veterans' organization. His passing was a great shock to his wife and friends as they could advance no reason for his suicide.
