Angeleno Takes Life Yesterday In Palos Verdes

On a second attempt yesterday afternoon to locate a reported suicide in Palos Verdes, deputy sheriffs found the body of James J. Sheehan, 48, of 1032 South Cloverdale avenue or 1562 South Curson, Los Angeles, slumped over the wheel of his Plymouth coach with a garden hose connected to the car's exhaust under his nose.

Sheehan left no suicide note but officers said he was apparently in financial difficulties. It is not known if he had any family. An earlier hunt for the car and man, made after deputy sheriffs received a report of the case, failed and it was not until Officer Woodley, a special deputy in Palos Verdes, joined the search that the Angeleno's body was found.

your account number changed at any time by applying to the Social Security board and showing good reasons for the change.

Signature Important
There are five ways in which an employee's application may be returned to Postmaster Chamber at the Torrance office or Postmaster Birda Paddock at Lomita and in no case is it necessary to prepay postage. The five ways: Handed to messenger, to any labor organization of which you are a member; to your letter carrier; delivered to the post office in person or by messenger, or mailed in a sealed envelope, addressed to the postmaster.

When an account number has been assigned, a card certifying that an account has been set up in the employee's name and this will be returned to the worker. Upon receipt of that card it should be immediately signed by you. This is important since your signature, as usually written, is required to validate the card. If the card is handed to you by your employer he will keep a record of your account number. If it is received by you from some other source, you should immediately inform your employer of your account number in order to complete his record.

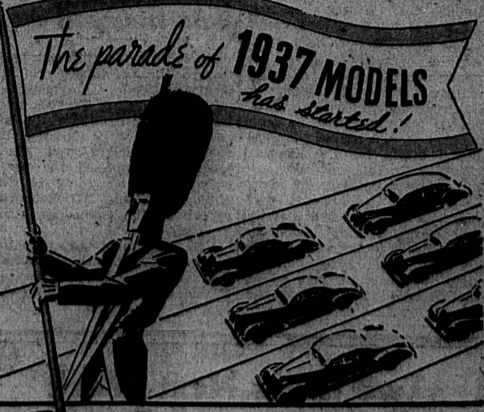
