Lineup Uncertain

Comrada, Gaucho Chief, Seeks Strong Combination for Game

Coach Ben Comrada was still in doubt today about his starting line-up against Washington's behemoths, said to be the heaviest team in the city playoff race. The Presidents average 190 pounds on the line with a 246-pound center, while their backfield will be more evenly matched with the Narbonne ball-packers.

With Clayton still out because of a leg injury and Hansen benched with a battered nose, Comrada may send this string into the title contest tomorrow afternoon:

Whitacre or Glover, right end; Cook or Savant, right tackle; Likens or Lovell, right guard; Gardner or Moore, center; Hirata, left guard; Brians, left tackle; Powell, left end; Woods or Likens, quarterback; Haslam, left half; Hard, right half, and Moyle, full.
The Narbonne coach has re-

ceived word that the three winners of tomorrow's playoffs will draw to see which two will play in the Coliseum the week after Thanksgiving. The team winning the bye date will meet the victor of that game the following week to decide the city championship.

Lomitans Making Strong Bid for Pennant; Beat University 19-6

One step nearer a possible city championship, Narbonne's Gauchos clash with Washington high tomorrow afternoon, 2:30 o'clock on Griffin Field. Narbonne crushed University 19 to 6 in last week's first playoff game, the victory being handed to the Lomitans by Halfback Warren Haslam.

If that young man is not on the all-Marine, all-City and all-Southern California prep mythical teams when the curtain finally falls on the 1936 campaign there's going to be a lot of disgruntled fans in this part of the Southland.

Last Friday he remained the City's leading scorer when he made all three of the Gauchos' touchdowns. Haslam was the bright and shining star of the game and received excellent support from the other 10 gridsters on Coach Ben Comrada's tricky, fast and powerful squad.

To Cheer Gauchos Narbonne gets another crack at the pennant with the First Presidents, thumping over Bell last Friday, 28-0, furnishing the opposition. From a win in this game, the Comradans advance toward the next stage, dependent on the outcome of the other remaining interlocking games.

A large contingent of Torrance fans are planning to join Lomitans in cheering for the Gauchos tomorrow afternoon. There were many from here down on Griffin Field last week to see the Narbonne-University contest and they were well satisfied with the thrilling plays unrolled on that greensward.

The undefeated L. A. high Romans will play the Roosevelt Roughriders at Roosevelt's field tomorrow afternoon. Manual has plenty of competition in meeting Belmont.

There will be no interlocking title games next week because of the fourth annual football carnival to be held at the Los Angeles coliseum on Nov. 25. Lewinger will open that grid extravaganza, playing Van Nuys. The remaining periods of the game will see the following paired teams in action: San Fernando vs. Jordan, University vs. Bell, Belmont vs. Narbonne, Roosevelt vs. Manual Arts and L. A. vs. Washington.

ROMANS PUT TARTARS OUT OF CITY RACE

2,500 See Local Team Overpowered by Bigger Squad

It might have been because the game was played on Friday the 13th but it was more likely because of Jim Murphy and his hulking team-mates that Torrance lost its final football game of the 1936 season and a chance at the city schools title when big Los Angeles high school mopped up here, 42-0.

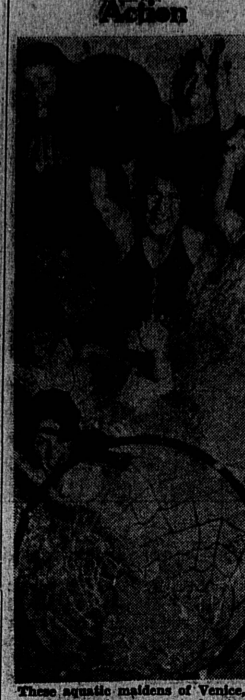
Murphy, captain and left end for the Romans, assisted by Jess Faris, left half, and Andy Dominico, substitute half, scored all the Angelenos' points, running rough-shod over the Tartars before a crowd numbering 2,500. The invading Roman contingent of blue and white decorated cars swept into the city bearing more rooters for L. A. high than Torrance had on the field.

The Tartars' defeat was not unexpected altho the score approached the "paper edge" given the Romans by local gridsters who compared the records of the two teams. Coach Bernie Donahue's squad put up a gallant fight but were hopelessly outweighed and outnumbered in reserve strength. Coach Bert LaBoucherie had developed a smart, fast-moving eleven that went places all season long and in the future interlocking games for the city pennant should go far.

Colorful L. A. Band
Murphy's talented foe accounted for all six conversions. This youngster, 170 pounds and fast, graduates this spring and he'll bear watching in college play. For Torrance Jim Amman spark-plugged the Tartars and received excellent support from his backfield, notably from Madore and Trezise. The line bucked up at intervals and stopped the Romans, who made most of their gains and three of their six touchdowns around end.

Faris went around end for 40 yards to the first one early in the opening quarter. A blocked punt recovered by Murphy added the second. A pass, Faris to Murphy for 40 yards bagged the third in the first period.
