Standard Tread, Wider and Longer Bodies Feature 1937 Willys Line

Back to standard tread, longer and wider bodies, the 1937 Willys is stepping out in full-grown proportions at L. James Jenkins' showroom at 1318 Cabrillo avenue, where it is being accepted as the cleverest car in the South Bay district. With one model priced at \$395 f.o.b. factory the Willys still remains the lowest priced full-sized car on the market today.

The new line consists of a five-passenger, four-door sedan and a coupe, standard and deluxe, with 56-inch standard tread and an over-all length of 175 1/2 inches, longer than last year's model by 1 1/2 inches. Designed by Amos Northrup, whose creations have been confined to higher priced cars, it is considered to be the safest car in America. The all steel body and top, low center of gravity, safety glass thruout and fender headlights which reduce the possibility of side-swiping in traffic or on narrow roads.

Flanked by wide fenders, into which new "eyeball" type headlamps are molded, the new car's rounded front offers no suggestion of a radiator. Rows of chromium-plated louvers, extending around the hood compartment help to conceal the air vents. The topmost point of the curved roof stands five feet, five inches from the street line. The long, slanting rear deck panel houses the spare wheel and tire and a luggage compartment, which, on the sedan model, provides 13 cubic feet of space.

Has Economy Engine

The one-piece hood is hinged at the rear, lifted from the front, offering easy access to all parts of the engine and battery. Headlight glare is minimized by the one-piece, slanting windshield. The new models will be available in six standard colors. Dulux synthetic enamel will be used on all 1937 models. Car owners have found that Dulux usually requires washing only to maintain new car appearance.

The designer has taken into consideration both safety and comfort, and has provided a front seat 60 inches wide, which is considerably more than the average width of the conventional car. The one-piece front seat is adjustable.

Body construction is all steel thruout, the roof, doors and inner panels, pillars, sills cross members and floor panels all being of this material. The dome light has been moved backward to a position above the rear window so that the light beams flow across the passengers' shoulders. Upholstered arm rests are provided in the rear passenger compartment to provide added comfort.

The Willys recognized economy performance, up to 35 miles per gallon of gasoline is accomplished with an engine, having a bore of 3 1/4 inches and a stroke of 4 1/4 inches. An outstanding feature of the new Willys power plant is a new variable type venturi carburetor giving smoother engine operation and uniform mixture. An adjustable main jet for altitude and climatic changes is included.

MINOR PARTIES STAY IN EXISTENCE, REPORT

None of the smaller political parties will pass out of existence in California this year, although few votes were cast for minor candidates at the November election. The Commonwealth, Progressive and Communist parties will remain in existence until after the next gubernatorial election at least.
