MRS. SIMPSON'S EYES Indicate Personality Color

Captivating American Makes History As Creator Of A New Fashion Trend

THE first indication of the personal tastes and preferences which have caused Mrs. Simpson's spectacular success in London society, comes with a United Press release about the new winter wardrobe being created for her in Paris.

It seems that the fascinating Baltimorean matches the smartness of her costumes to the sophistication of her wit. She favors gowns of extreme classic simplicity at a time when the fashion world is bedecking itself with frills and turbelows. Perhaps this is in deference to the King's own taste, for he is noted for his preference for tailored chic in the costumes of his women friends. At any rate it points the way toward high "coronation" fashions in which cut and color predominate as style features.

Speaking in detail, the United Press correspondent describes an afternoon costume of brown wool, with a straight, short skirt worn with a tailored fitted jacket of the same material, and a blue angora blouse which is tailored and fitted on the same lines as the jacket and "matches her eyes".

Wallis Simpson is noted for her vivid blue eyes. Though her distinctive taste may lead her to set a new pace for winter clothes, in choosing colors to flatter her most fascinating feature, she is in line with a trend that both couturiers

and cosmeticians have been promoting with increasing enthusiasm. This trend is based on the belief that the color of a woman's eyes—the color nature gave her—is her true personality color, and to it she should key her clothes and cosmetics.

The new so-called "coronation colors" are off-shades that are difficult to wear. To look well in them, a woman's makeup must not only be faultlessly becoming, but she must be clever enough to set off a difficult shade with some harmonizing tint that is flattering to her own coloring. Mrs. Simpson, for instance, with her black hair and bright blue eyes, would look far less glamorous in her chic, brown suit if she had not ordered a blue blouse to bring the whole ensemble into focus with her own particular type and personality.

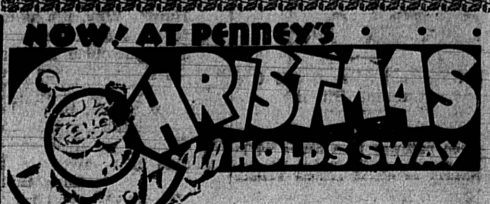

Amateurs Score Hit

Home Talent Variety Show at Woman's Club Enjoyed by 200

Not mentioned on the program but one of the chief entertainers—although he cannot qualify as a Simon-pure amateur, Sam Levy served as master of ceremonies at the home-talent variety show staged last Friday night by the Torrance Woman's Club to benefit the clubhouse fund.

A good majority of the 200 people in the enthusiastic audience believed that "Emcee" Levy should have been given one of the cash prizes awarded by the judges—Mr. and Mrs. E. P. Maulsby, of Los Angeles, and Van Barthecko, of Keystone—to the three outstanding contributions. He presented the act—minus a Major Bowes' "cut-and-dried" dialogue and gong—in a rapid-fire fashion that the entertainers themselves maintained.

Myra Smith's tap-dancing was judged the best on the program. When it came to the second prize, the judges were unable to decide between Frank Lawver, accordionist, and Everett Balcom, guitarist, who appeared as a duet and in solo numbers, and Duane Turner, crooner. A flip of a coin gave Lawver and Balcom the second cash prize and Turner took third.

Dancers and Singers
All of the acts were exceptionally well presented and the young people displayed good radio technique in presenting their offerings thru a public address system. The bill opened with two popular numbers by Midge Higgins, followed by a girls' trio, Muriel Alverson, Coral Lindeman and Marjorie Page. The "Three Notes" on the program were only two as one did not appear; however, Welber Franklin and Leonard Vorhis turned in some hot music on violin and guitar.

Naomi Riley in a boy-tramp costume read "The Volunteer Organist"; Donna McCutchen sang two numbers gracefully; Betty Dalton stepped a fast tap routine, and Kenneth Hull, accompanied by his father, sang most creditably. Another tap dancer was Marguerite Darling, and Bob Sleeth, accompanied by his father who was impressed into the program by "Emcee" Levy for an added attraction, sang popular selections. Louis Murray starred in a madcap comedy skit; Myra Smith danced to win first prize, and Dorothy Mae Jones revealed a voice that deserves training for its lyrical qualities.

Play Closes Show
Duane Turner made a hit with his rendition of "Empty Saddle"; Virginia Crandell's "Goodie" comedy tap was an amusing entry; Betty Dalton and Marguerite Darling pleased with a well-rehearsed military stair dance and the program closed with the presentation of a one-act comedy playlet, "Romance While You Wait," with Bob Fernley, Azeele Harrison and Dick Clutter in the cast.

Mrs. H. C. Barrington, chairman of the club's ways and means committee, was credited by Levy with doing a major part of arranging the show, given to help "lift the mortgage" from the clubhouse.
