Advice Given Parents

Dr. Maude Wilde is Woman's Club Luncheon Speaker

Dr. Maude Wilde on her annual visit to the Torrance Woman's Club yesterday chose as her topic of discussion "Mental Health and Glandular Treatment." She stated that the first hospital for mental illness was erected in 1874 thru the efforts of a Miss Dix. Other steps were taken in this direction when Charles Bears, an author who recovered from a mental disease, published the book, "The Mind That Found Itself."

Dr. Wilde pointed out that 75 percent of all sickness is mental and urged parents to guard against making their children ill when they are forced to confront certain issues. Rather, parents should teach them to meet the realities of life by talking difficult problems over with them and helping to smooth them out, she said. Dr. Wilde is the founder of Mothers' Educational Center, accredited with being such a splendid help to children of pre-school age. The Torrance center meets the fourth Friday of the month. At the last meeting, which was held in the clubhouse Nov. 27, 21 children were registered. Mrs. Raymond Rogers is in charge of the center.

Musical Treat Dorothy Wilde, charming daughter of Dr. Wilde, sang a group of three numbers. Her songs were well chosen and her lovely coloratura soprano voice was sincerely appreciated by all. Mrs. George Mershon played the piano accompaniment.

RICE PUDDING 1 tablespoon cornstarch 3 cups milk 2 eggs 1/2 cup sugar 1 cup cooked hot rice 1 teaspoon lemon extract 2 tablespoons sugar Blend cornstarch with a little milk, and stir in remaining milk. Add egg yolks mixed with sugar. Heat over boiling water; when hot, add rice and stir carefully until it begins to thicken. Remove from heat and add extract. Beat egg whites stiff and fold in two tablespoons sugar. Place pudding in greased baking dish, cover with meringue and bake in slow oven (300 degrees) until nicely browned. Serves six to eight.

Paris Styles

PARIS, (U.P.)—A whole page of fashion hints to blondes is offered in the current publication of Jardins des Modes, popular French fashion magazine.

The most important step, according to this magazine, is the choice of soft, becoming colors. Soft greys, blues, beige, greyish-green and black are the most flattering shades for a blonde who must avoid brilliant colors so as not to look faded.

This magazine suggests a sports outfit of greyish-green to be made up into a straight skirt or solid green wool and a fitted, tailored jacket of green and black plaid wool. This costume is worn with a polo coat of greyish beige that is fitted and trimmed with four large patch pockets.

For street wear, a shade of slate blue wool is chosen to make a tailored one-piece dress that is worn with a three-quarter length coat of the same slate-blue trimmed with a stock scarf of beaver fur while large patch pockets of beaver trim the skirt of the coat and make the belt for the dress.

Beige wool is used for an afternoon dress with three-quarter length sleeves and a skirt that is pleated all around. Black velvet likewise is advised for afternoon or cocktail wear with a black broadcloth coat trimmed in silver fox fur.

Deep purplish-red velvet is advised for dinner wear in a long-sleeved, long-skirted gown while powder blue satin is used for a tight-fitting evening gown that is made with a low cut décolleté and a full trained skirt.
