1936 Ling Medal

Mrs. Evan Lewis, manager of the Bureau of Health Centers for Los Angeles Tenth district, was presented the 1936 Ling gold medal for her unselfish and outstanding work in behalf of the health progress of the children of California, particularly of Los Angeles city school district. The medal was presented by Dr. Sven Lokrantz, director of health for the Los Angeles city schools and chairman of the board of governors of the Ling Foundation.

The purpose of the Ling Foundation of Los Angeles is to forward child health work and to award anyone who has unselfishly worked in behalf of their health progress. Peter Henrik Ling, 1776-1839, is the father of formal gymnastics and corrective gymnastics for school children used in every civilized country in the world. Mr. Ling has probably done more for the physical upbuilding of the youth than any other man.

"Christmas is a time for generosity of spirit. It is harder now than any other time to be mean and to cherish grudges, to be suspicious and uncharitable to our fellowman.
